California Readers of T.-R. Write in Appreciation of Paper for Comprehensive Story of Terrible Disaster—News of Los Angeles of Interest to Marshalltown.

Readers of the Times-Republican in California, and especially the southern part, where so many former Marshalltown and Marshall county people live, are evidently appreciative of the Times-Republican's complete reports of the terrible Rock Island disaster, which proved to hold the same intense interest so many miles away as it did here at home.

Many of the T.-R. readers in southern California have written expressing their keen appreciation of the paper, and especially the accounts furnished of the wreck. 
