SAYS GARST WILL WIN

SENATOR CUMMINS PREDICTS VICTORY FOR PROGRESSIVE CANDIDATE.

WIRES HIS CONGRATULATIONS BECAUSE OF CANDIDACY

Gilbertson Retires as Campaign Manager Because of Ill Health—Both Cummins and Dolliver to Enter Campaign in Behalf of Garst and Other Progressive Candidates.

Des Moines, April 2.—Senator Albert B. Cummins yesterday wired Warren Garst his congratulations upon his announcement as progressive candidate for governor and predicted victory for Garst and the progressive cause over B. E. Carroll, who seeks renomination.

The senator's telegram follows: Washington, April 2.—I congratulate you upon your candidacy for governor. I hope and believe that you will carry the progressive banner to complete victory. ALBERT B. CUMMINS.

Friends of Governor Garst are informed that both the senators will come to Iowa to participate in the campaign for the progressive cause, and the fight will begin at once. Nomination papers have been sent out already by Governor Garst and will be ready before the time for filing expires, which will be April 26.

Already the progressive republican committee of Iowa is on the job in the interests of the progressive candidates. The gubernatorial campaign of Des Moines, who for years has been at the head of this organization, yesterday announced his retirement because of ill health and inability to become actively engaged in the campaign.

His duties as chairman will be once upon the shoulders of Robert J. Fleming of Des Moines and until further reorganization he will be at the head of the committee.

Circulate Nomination Papers. The circulation of nomination papers calling for the placing of Mr. Garst's name on the ballot already has been started. It is being impressed upon the minds of progressives who are to circulate the papers that the time is short and rapid fire action is needed. The last filing day for the papers is April 26.

There is talk also of arranging for a big state wide meeting for progressives within a short time to be held at the Des Moines coliseum for the purpose of starting off the campaign and perfecting organization.

All the energy and vigor which have characterized progressive campaigns in the past will be injected into this battle. Governor Garst will conduct a speaking campaign and both Senator Cummins and Dolliver will come into the state and speak for the success of the progressive candidates. This insures one of the hottest campaigns in the history of the state.

Progressives express gratification over the announcement of former Governor Garst for the republican nomination for governor. There has been a general demand over the state for opposition to Governor Carroll and Mr. Garst's announcement is in response to this sentiment.

It is the belief of progressives that it is absolutely necessary to have a progressive at the head of the state administration and that a progressive candidate for this position will aid the progressives in their battle to control the state convention and see that the Iowa insurgents in congress receive the endorsement of the state.

BYERS ENDORSES GARST. Considers Him One of the Able Men of the State. Council Bluffs, April 2.—The announcement of the candidacy of Warren Garst for governor of Iowa, which appears in the news dispatches yesterday causes considerable speculation in political circles here. Progressive republicans, although not prepared for such an announcement, were nevertheless, taken somewhat by surprise.

When seen regarding the announcement at the Grand hotel Attorney General Byers made the statement that he had not heard the report until it was brought to his mind by the reporter, that he had been expecting it for some time.

"Warren Garst is one of the able men of this state," he went on to say. "And ever since his very able and comprehensive message to the state legislature on succeeding Governor Cummins to the gubernatorial chair he has been in the public eye. What that message caused comment in all parts of the union as well as the state of Iowa."

"When asked his opinion of the cause of Garst's sudden determination to enter the race, Mr. Byers said: "I can not say for I do not know definitely. It has probably been the cause of the announcement at this time. The statements recently made by that organization, especially regarding the coming political events and policies of the state have been in themselves a challenge to the progressives to put out their candidates. This naturally forced the announcement at this time."

"Do you consider Mr. Garst as good a man as the progressive wing of the republican party has at the present time?" was asked. "Well, that is hard to say, of course, but I consider him one of the brightest men in the state. He is keen, broad minded and resourceful, and on all occasions has demonstrated his ability to cope with matters of public importance. He was governor of the state for six weeks, but he made a name for himself in that time which brought him into prominence all over the country. He has been in politics for the last twenty-five years, and in all that time had been one of the strong men of the party. He would make a splendid governor, too, if he should be elected."

DISTINGUISHED MEN ADDRESS MEETINGS OF THE CLUB

Chicago, April 2.—With the view of creating a sort of brotherhood among ex-Iowans who are now living in Chicago, and for the further purpose of maintaining their pride in the substantial progress of their old state, as well as their interest in its welfare, an organization was effected about a year ago, known as the Hawkeye Fellowship Club of Chicago. In the beginning, the membership numbered only a few men, but it has gradually gained strength and influence until now it has over two hundred on its rolls, and it is still growing.

Permanent headquarters are maintained in one of the parlors of the Grand Pacific Hotel, and the weekly meetings are addressed by men of marked distinction, including such notables as Senator Cummins, Ex-Governor Larrabee, and others. The meetings are made exceedingly interesting through the general discussions which usually ensue and the spirit of good fellowship which prevails.

Structures of the club are open every day, and are in charge of Mrs. McClellan, formerly of Ottumwa. Iowans visiting Chicago are cordially invited to visit the headquarters, and make every possible use of them for their own benefit. Free telephone facilities for writing letters, information concerning the city, and meeting fellow Iowans are some of the club's advantages, and if you should happen to be there on a meeting day, you can be royally entertained. The club has no business side or business function, being purely social. "Holidays Days" are among the enjoyable features.

Lake City, April 2.—The first architectural improvement to take place in Lake City this year was started yesterday when the ground was broken for the Central Mutual Telephone Company's exchange building, at the northwest corner of the public square. 


