ISSUES ARE RAISED

GOVERNOR CARROLL'S PLATFORM GIVES PROGRESSIVES FIGHTING MATERIAL.

GOVERNOR'S PLATFORM FAILS TO CREATE GENERAL INTEREST

Doubt Over Consolidation of Campaign With That of the Jackson Committee—State Decides to Erect Silos at the Institutional Farms—Cannon Asked to Orate at Nevada.

Des Moines, April 15.—The announcement of the candidacy of Governor Carroll and determination to submit his name again to the voters for approval or disapproval at the June primary caused no surprise after the conference of B. Murphy, ex-state printer, with Secretary Nye and others of the political advisers of the governor.

"It is pretty much like the entire administration," said one. "Evidently the fact has not yet penetrated to the state house that we are in the midst of one of the greatest political conflicts of our time," said another.

About the city and even in the corridors of the capitol there would be no use making the fight. The statement on the part of the governor that he had no knowledge of the standpat conference held in conjunction with the good roads meeting, and which resulted in formation of the Jackson committee, came as a surprise.

It has now been five weeks since Mr. Berryhill, on behalf of the McKinley syndicate, wrote the platform which was adopted, and during all this time the governor had not once given an intimation that he was in ignorance of the plans of the regular standpatters or that he did not fully approve their program for endorsing Taft and not endorsing the Iowa senators. In fact there is evidence that his immediate political managers have been active in association with the Jackson standpat house, coal bins, fenced, grape vineyard bearing, other fruit, shade trees. As to whether or not the campaign for governor will be conducted from a headquarters separate from the Jackson committee is not now known. From the manner in which it was launched it is expected that the two movements will be kept separate. The governor has a corps of strong politicians at his command—Secretary Nye, Commissioner Van Dusen, Secretary Moore, Secretary Sumner, General Byers, Mr. Ellis, and others in official places.

There has been no disposition on the part of the progressives to raise any issues as to the Carroll administration, but in the letter of the governor several questions are made an issue and probably these will receive attention. The state of Iowa is going to build a dozen or more silos at the state farms and feed silage to the dairy herds. Having set a good example for the other farmers in most matters it is now contemplated the silo construction shall be done. A committee consisting of John F. Wade, M. N. Volstead and F. J. Sessions, went yesterday to Ames to consult with the college people in regard to the way to build a silo and the best kind of material for a silo. It is very likely that hollow brick silos will be built. Concrete is also good but brick is a little cheaper. It was represented to the board of control at the last meeting that wood alone was suitable for silos and the committee has been making an investigation which has convinced them that some other material is better.

There seems to be very great probability of the consideration of the name of Justice Deemer in connection with the vacancy on the supreme bench. It was feared, for a time, that Iowa was so completely on the blacklist at Washington that no Iowa man would be considered for any place. Within the past week, however, information has been received which shows that it is realized that Iowa is on the map. If Justice Deemer should be appointed to the federal bench it would cause a lively stir among the lawyers for the filling of his place.

Some surprise was expressed here on learning that Speaker Cannon had been invited by Congressman Hull, on the suggestion of W. O. Payne, to make the Fourth of July address at Nevada. If he accepts this will be the first appearance of the speaker in the Seventh district since he opened the campaign at Knoxville, Tenn., in August of last year. That the speaker would be a drawing card is certain.

PROBING HEALTH OFFICE.

Governor Starts Investigation of Disposition of Fees. Des Moines, April 15.—Governor Carroll has instituted an investigation into the office of the state board of health relative to the collection and disposition of fees.

The probe was started some time ago when Secretary Cannon, who has been in office only since Jan. 1, reported that he could find no records of any fees for reciprocal certificates or for dead bodies sent to the medical college which were turned over to the state while the office was in charge of Dr. Lewis A. Thomas.

The governor, acting upon this report of Secretary Sumner, immediately began an investigation. He will not say how far it will go, declining to discuss the case until he has had time to study the opinion handed down in the case yesterday by Attorney General Byers. "I am not making any charge of graft," said Secretary Sumner yesterday morning, "for Secretary Thomas can probably explain satisfactorily where the money taken in was placed. It couldn't find any records showing the disposition of the fees, however, and as I want things straight and correct in this office I want to the governor for advice. I had \$500 in fees collected

SMITH'S MANAGERS BLUNDER.

Circulars Laid Young's Attack on Nonpareil for Campaign Purposes. Council Bluffs, April 15.—The managers of Congressman Smith's campaign have made what is regarded as an egregious blunder by attacking the Council Bluffs Nonpareil, which newspaper has been conducting the congressional campaign in the Ninth district with equal privileges to Smith and Byers and special favors for neither, notwithstanding the well known progressive sentiment of the owners and editors.

In a circular to voters asking for memberships to the Taft republican club of the Ninth district, is enclosed a slip upon which is printed an editorial from the Des Moines Capital taking to task the Nonpareil for opposing Judge Smith, a townsman. Astute Smith politicians have jumped all over the author of the circular for hitting Judge Smith's candidacy to the Taft club in so pronounced a manner and for the attack on the Nonpareil thru the Capital, which has for so many years conducted a notorious fight on Senator Cummins, albeit he is a "fellow townsman." The matter has occasioned much comment and has proven the most interesting incident in the preliminary campaign in the district. It is rumored that a large number of the circulars and postal cards which had not been mailed were ordered withheld after the first batch had been given circulation.

FARMERS COMING BACK

Many Returning From West to Work in Sugar Beet Fields in Waverly and Vicinity—Special Train to Bring 200. Waverly, April 15.—One thousand farmers are now being brought to Iowa from Kansas, Illinois, and other states to grow beets for the Iowa Sugar Company at Waverly. All the railroads are bringing these people to this state, and the Rock Island will run a special train next Tuesday from Topeka, Kan., to northern Iowa for this purpose. This train will carry more than 200 persons, all of them experienced farmers, pioneers in that state, and the peculiar contrast in the situation is that these people are now returning east to good old Iowa, the state of opportunities that have not and will not be exhausted for some time.

GARFIELD COMING TO IOWA.

Former Secretary of Interior to Speak in Des Moines. Des Moines, April 15.—James R. Garfield son of the former president, and former secretary of the interior, will deliver the chief address at the annual banquet of the Grant Club on April 21. Mr. Garfield will come to Des Moines from Denver.

GARST HAS STANDPAT FRIENDS.

Cedar Rapids, April 15.—While it is probable the contest in Linn county between Garst and Carroll will follow largely the old standpat-progressive alignment, it is possible Garst will make a better showing than such an alignment would reveal. A number of standpatters have declared their friendship for Garst, the not, however, to the extent of saying they will vote for him at the primaries. Their attitude during the campaign will probably be one of inactivity. Many of the progressives are urging the waging of a relentless war on the standpatters all along the line.

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STABBED ON TRAIN.

Telegraph Operator of Reinbeck Gets in Mixup—Stabbed and Robbed. Waterloo, April 15.—A Chicago Great Western telegraph operator employed at Reinbeck, giving his name as F. W. Johnson and Chicago as his home, was held up Wednesday evening on a freight train coming into Waterloo between this city and Wilson Junction by an unknown assailant and robbed of about \$10 in money. In the fight that followed the robbing, Johnson sustained several deep gashes in the neck from a pocket knife in the hands of the assailant, which necessitated the attention of a surgeon upon his arrival in the city. It was necessary to take four stitches to close the gashes. The men had been drinking.

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Johnson appeared reticent concerning his assailant and stated that he would prefer to get him himself as he expressed it and settle the score between them. Later he consented to give a description of the man who is believed to have made for this city after the stabbing affair on the train.

J. Robertson in speaking of his recent investigation of the second of the five mail routes out of the city. "If an inspector should come along right now and go over the route, I am convinced that more than half of the patrons would have their service discontinued."

Notable Senatorial Fight of Four Years Ago to Be Repeated. Webster City, April 15.—While no official announcement of his candidacy has been made, D. C. Chase, of this city, is circulating nomination papers which will permit him to enter the primary in June as a republican candidate for state senator in this, the thirty-seventh senatorial district, against the Hon. Charles F. Peterson of Clarion, the present incumbent. Mr. Peterson has served one term and is also a candidate for a second term.

It will be recalled that when Mr. Peterson was nominated four years ago in convention Mr. Chase was his chief opponent. The convention first convened at Iowa Falls, deadlocked several days, then adjourned for two weeks, came to Webster City and repeated the battle in June as a republican candidate for state senator in this, the thirty-seventh senatorial district, against the Hon. Charles F. Peterson of Clarion, the present incumbent. Mr. Peterson has served one term and is also a candidate for a second term.

Just what the issue will be between Messrs. Peterson and Chase is not yet apparent to the public, as both are allied with the equalization movement.

For several days the Chase nomination papers have been in circulation over the district, and have been very generally signed.

AFTER LOCAL CORPORATIONS. Tax Ferret Declares Five Ottumwa Concerns Are Assessed Too Low. Ottumwa, April 15.—D. B. Davidson, tax ferret, engaged by the board of supervisors of Wapello county to look up back taxes and to see that taxes are paid on all taxable property, appeared before the city council as a board of equalization to discuss the valuation on the properties of several large corporations who have their headquarters in Ottumwa. He declared that the valuation was too low and should be increased. The properties which he had in view were John Morrell & Co., Ottumwa Railway & Light Company, Roseland Fuel Company, Phillips Fuel Company, and Fowler & Wilson Coal Company.

M. C. Gilmore appeared before the board of equalization to look after the interests of his client, the Roseland Fuel Company. Mr. Gilmore states that the assessor had placed the valuation on the property between \$1,300 and \$1,400, while Tax Ferret Davidson declares that it should be increased to \$11,000, as the company is capitalized for that amount.
