SEEKING TO CREATE PREJUDICE AGAINST GARST AND CUMMINS

Insinuations Being Made Against Many Progressive Leaders—Some of the Fakes and Falsehoods Being Shown Up—Progressives Fighting For Principles Solely.

Special to Times-Republican. Des Moines, May 4.—That the standpatpers hope to win their battle in Iowa for restoration to full power by a campaign of deliberate misrepresentations and the poorest kind of mud-slinging is now very evident.

During the past two weeks they have caused to be sent out to the daily and weekly papers of the state some of the rawest canards ever conjured up in the brains of desperate politicians.

First—Attacks and insinuations against men whom Governor Cummins appointed to office. Second—Misrepresentations about Governor Garst and digging up anything that might create prejudice against him.

There have been insinuations against John Cownie, against ex-Secretary Thomas, against C. W. Phillips, against H. R. Wright, against ex-commissioner Brigham, and many others.

Another sample of the methods of the standpat machine was to circulate what purported to be interviews with Congressman Good and others of the Iowa delegation, indicating that they had gone back on their principles.

This is the sort of a campaign the standpatpers have set out to make in the people of Iowa. Columns might be filled with a showing as to the sheer dishonesty of the methods in use.

FIVE THOUSAND BIRDS TO BE LOOSED IN IOWA

Purchased in Hungary and Bohemia at Price of \$5 to \$6 Per Pair—Deliveries to be Made in Autumn—Each County of State to Receive About Fifty Pairs.

Special to Times-Republican. Cedar Rapids, May 4.—State Fish and Game Warden Lincoln, who is exceedingly anxious to provide an abundance of game for the Iowa hunters who have been pouring their dollars into the state treasury, has contracted for 5,000 pairs of Hungarian partridges.

Mr. Lincoln will also purchase 5,000 eggs from the Chinese pheasant. These eggs will be hatched out in the state and the birds turned loose. Most of the pheasant eggs will come from Oregon. The eggs will be given to farmers who desire them for hatching purposes.
