For centuries Old London bridge, with its double row of houses, was the home of generations who lived and traded over the Thames waters. Holbein lived and painted there; Osborne, the apprentice lad leaped through a window in the house of his master, Sir William Hewitt, to the rescue of Sir William's daughter, who had fallen into the swollen flood of the river below, and by winning her for his wife laid the foundation of the dual house of Leeds. Crispin Tucker had his shop on the bridge, to which Pope and Swift and many another outflow of fame made pilgrimages to purchase books and gossip with the waggish shopkeeper. Crocker's dictionary was printed "at the Looking Glass on London Bridge," and gigantic corn mills dominated the south end of the structure, not many yards from the won-

terful Nonsuch House, a high wooden pile with turrets and cupolas brought from Holland.
