SPEAKS AT BERLIN UNIVERSITY ON "THE WORLD MOVEMENT"

MISSISSIPPI PACKET CITY OF SALTILLO GOES DOWN IN DEEP WATER.

STRIKES ROCK NEAR SHORE WHEN NEARING ST. LOUIS

ONE DEAD RECOVERED AND TWELVE OTHERS MISSING—OF THOSE LOST SEVEN WERE PASSENGERS—WOMEN AND CHILDREN AMONG THE VICTIMS—PASSENGERS ENTRAPPED IN CABINS.

St. Louis, May 12.—Thirteen persons, seven of them passengers, lost their lives in the Mississippi river, when the packet, City of Saltillo, struck a rock and foundered in reach of the shore at Glen Park, twenty-four miles south of St. Louis, last night.

THE DEAD.

CARRIED THIRTY-SEVEN PASSENGERS.

The boat carried twenty-seven passengers and a crew of thirty. Shortly before reaching Glen Park, the Saltillo encountered a shoreward draw and all efforts to prevent a collision were unavailing and the vessel struck a rock and sank in twenty feet of water. The passengers and crew clung to the broken timbers while those able to do so lent their aid to the rescue of the helpless. Only one body has been recovered, that of Mrs. Rhea.

CAUGHT IN THE CABIN.

A majority of the passengers were in the cabins and the collision came so suddenly that they were plunged into the water before they knew what had happened. As fast as the occupants of the steamer were dragged to shore they were taken to the Gleneco company's boarding house, where they were cared for. A telephone message brought relief from St. Louis and Desoto.

EXPERT ON CROP OUTLOOK.
