ANOTHER OF OLDEST PIONEERS IS DEAD

ALVA ANSON, ONE OF CITY'S FIRST SETTLERS, PASSES AWAY.

LANDLORD OF ONE OF TOWN'S FIRST HOTELS

Conducted Hotel in Early Day at Corner of Main and Center Streets. Also in What is Now Tremont Block—Was Brother of Henry Anson, "Father of Marshalltown"—Sketch of Career.

Death at 10:10 o'clock Sunday night claimed Alva Anson, one of the very early pioneers of Marshalltown, and brother of the late Henry Anson, known as "the father of Marshalltown." Mr. Anson's death occurred at the state hospital at Independence, and was due to an attack of hemorrhages of the bowels, with which he was stricken Friday night. Mr. Anson had been a patient in the hospital two weeks, his condition being due to his advanced years.

Alva Anson was one of the real pioneers of Marshalltown. There were members of his own family who preceded him here, but there are few people here now who were residents of the county when Mr. Anson decided to cast his lot with Marshalltown.

Mr. Anson was one of the first hotel landlords in the village of Marshalltown. His first venture was upstairs in the building at the northwest corner of Main and Center streets, where the hardware store of Abbott & Son now stands. Later he ran a hotel in what is now the Tremont block.

Lived Here Since 1855. Mr. Anson was a native of Canandaigua, N. Y., where he was born June 11, 1822. He was the eldest son of Warren and Elizabeth Anson, who moved from York state to Erie county, Ohio, in 1823.

Being attracted to the new country in Iowa, by reason of the fact that his two brothers, Henry and Horace, were here, Alva Anson came to Marshalltown in 1855, purchased land, and then went back to Ohio and returned with his family to make this his home in 1855.

After his first ventures Mr. Anson moved to his farm, just west of the present city limits, adjoining the old Governor Packard farm on the east. Here he lived for several years. For many years past Mr. Anson has made his home in this city, and has devoted his time to looking after local investments. He owned the brick building on North First street, which contains four store rooms, numbered 11 to 17. Mr. Anson also owned a small tract of timber land near Marietta.

Mr. Anson is survived by six sons and two daughters. The children are Monroe, Clarence and Miss Independence Anson, of this city; Warren Anson, living three miles west of town; Elgin Anson, of Marietta; Charles Anson, of Maxwell; Bert Anson, who lives in the state of Washington; and Mrs. Jennie Hyerstay, of Denver. Mr. Anson is also survived by one brother and two sisters, Horace Anson, of this city; Mrs. Emma Haviland, of Lake Helen, Fla.

THIEVES ENTER GROCERY.

William Springer's Store Entered Some Time Sunday Night. William Springer's grocery store at 6 West North street was entered, by thieves some time Sunday night, and a quantity of cigars and a small sum in change were stolen. Entrance was effected by breaking out a rear window. The robbery was not discovered until Mr. Springer reached his store this morning to open for the day's business.

Just what was stolen out of the store Mr. Springer is unable to say. So far he has missed about \$1 in change, which was left in the cash register, and between 300 and 400 cigars. The contents of the cash register, money drawers, and safe had been ransacked, evidently in a search for more money. Mr. Springer is confident that the thief or thieves, as the case may be, knew their business, as the cash register was found to have had the lead deadened by turning a small thumb screw. The burglar was reported to the police.

BAPTIST PASTOR TO GIVE ORATION AT ANNUAL RIVERSIDE OBSERVANCE.

RAYBURN TO PREACH MEMORIAL SERMON

Veterans of the City Will Attend Services at Presbyterian Church Next Sunday—School Children to Take Part in Exercises and Decorate Graves.

The plans for the annual observance of Memorial Day by Frank M. Thomas post, which is always held in the forenoon in order that there will be no conflict with the exercises at the soldiers home in the afternoon, have been completed by L. W. Robbins, commander of F. M. Thomas post. Rev. James McGee will deliver the address. The procession to Riverside will be formed at 8:30 o'clock, and promptly at 9 o'clock will move from in front of the court house, in charge of C. H. Brock as officer of the day. The members of Frank M. Thomas and Phil Sheridan posts will head the procession, followed by the W. R. C. and the Ladies of the G. A. R., sons of veterans, Spanish-American war veterans, the mayor and members of the city council, police force, and the public and parochial school children. The soldiers' home band and the Y. M. C. A. drum corps will furnish the music.

At Riverside the graves will be decorated by details of post members and the school children, the latter being in charge of Superintendent Aaron Palmer. Services for the unknown dead will be in charge of the W. R. C. A male quartet will sing at the cemetery. Mrs. J. W. Pursell will read Lincoln's Gettysburg address, and Rev. Mr. McGee will give the oration.

Rev. James Rayburn will give the annual sermon on Memorial Sunday, which precedes Memorial Day. On next Sunday the veterans of Frank M. Thomas post and the W. R. C., together with the two organizations from the soldiers' home, will meet at the court house at 10 o'clock and go to the Presbyterian church in a body.

SCHOOL SCORES FOUR POINTS.

Gabelman and Packer Get Second and Third in State Meet. Local entrants in the annual state high school track and field meet, held at Des Moines Saturday, captured four points for the Marshalltown high school, and placed the local school

eleventh place in the meet. Herman Gabelman won second in the 220 yard dash, which was won in :23 2-5 seconds, and Roscoe Packer got third in the 120 hurdles, which was won in :17. In the preliminaries Gabelman was first in the fourth heat of the 100 yard dash, which he ran in :14 4-5, and took first in the third heat of the 220 yard dash. Packer scored first in the third heat of the 120 hurdles preliminary, in which he finished in :17 1-5.

Caucuses to Select Delegates to the County Convention and to Express a Preference Which Shall Instruct Delegates as to Judicial Candidates to Be Held Tomorrow

The following tickets of delegates have been agreed upon between the three judicial candidates and the Progressive Republican Club of Marshall County and will be supported by the friends of each upon the common understanding stipulated in writing by the judicial candidates and accepted in writing by the delegates.

Table with 5 columns: FIRST WARD, SECOND WARD, THIRD WARD, FOURTH WARD, FIFTH WARD. Each column lists names of delegates and committee members.

The above delegates shall be instructed to vote in the county convention for the endorsement of the candidate for the republican nomination for district judge as indicated hereon:

- Check boxes for J. M. PARKER, J. J. WILSON, J. L. CARNEY in each ward column.

THE STIPULATION

The stipulation entered into by the three judicial candidates whereby the progressive club is to select a list of delegates for all concerned, is as follows:

We, the undersigned, candidates for district judge of this judicial district, in order to obtain from the republican voters of the several wards of the city of Marshalltown an expression of their preference as to which of the undersigned shall be a candidate for judge from Marshall county, hereby agree to the following:

- 1. That the progressive republican club select the delegates to the county convention from each ward.
2. That such delegates be those who agree in writing to be instructed by the voters.
3. That the names of the undersigned be printed on a ballot under the list of delegates with a square opposite each name.
4. That each voter shall express his choice by placing a cross in the square opposite the name of his choice.
5. That a caucus be held in each ward on the 24th day of May, 1910, beginning at the hour of 7 o'clock p. m., and closing at 9 o'clock p. m., and that each of the undersigned may have present a teller to assist the committeemen.
6. The undersigned hereby agree that they will neither recognize nor consent to any effort to appeal from the decision of these caucuses to the primary election in the wards, but nothing herein stipulated shall apply to any precinct other than the city wards, it being the essence of this agreement that the candidacy of each is to be presented to the county convention to be considered by the delegates from the entire county.
