CUMMINS RAPS SMITH SENATOR INVADERS THE ENEMY'S COUNTRY AND SPEAKS IN COUNCIL BLUFFS.

MOST ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING CHEERS NAME OF BYERS Cummins Said He Would Rather See Byers Elected to Congress Than to Personally Receive Any Honor Within the Gift of the People - Walter I. Smith Scored.

Council Bluffs, June 4.—An ovation was tendered Senator Cummins and Attorney General Byers when they appeared on the platform in the new auditorium last night to tell the people of Council Bluffs why Congressman Smith should not be renominated for congress. Senator Cummins, who made the principal talk, dealt firmly with Congressman Smith, holding up his record and showing where the latter has voted regularly and consistently with the Cannon organization and consequently with the interests of the east and against the interests of the west. Senator Cummins literally bearded the lion in the lion's den, but he did it in such a way as not to offend. He stuck close to the record, Smith's own record, and as he bored hole after hole into it, he drew rounds of applause from the vast audience.

Attorney General Byers was equally as vigorous in attacking Smith's record and the applause he drew was not less generous. Supporters of Congressman Smith have been claiming the city of Council Bluffs by a big majority, but the progressives have been maintaining that the attorney general possessed great strength here and had hosts of friends. The greeting accorded him and Senator Cummins last night bears out the claim. Enthusiastic Audience. Not only were the people of Council Bluffs enthusiastic, but the people from the rural communities over the county and district, who came to the city in great numbers for the meeting, were loud in their cheering. Early in the afternoon a long automobile parade came in from Walnut, Neola and other surrounding towns. The cars were decorated with long flags bearing the words "Honor for Byers" and "We're for Cummins and Byers." Special trains also brought in large crowds. Before the meeting the band entertained a great crowd in the city park and headed the procession to the auditorium. This was the first meeting held in this new structure but reports indicating that victory seems certain. The district is aroused, a keen interest is taken in the contest, and it is claimed that this means more progressive republican votes.

Parade Cummins' Escort. Senator Cummins was escorted from the hotel to the auditorium by a parade of automobiles. He rode at the head of the procession in the car of Dr. T. B. Lacey, accompanied by C. S. Byers, brother of the attorney general, F. H. Keyes, president of the Pottawattamie Byers Club; O. J. McManus, district secretary; Robert B. Wall, secretary of the Byers Club, and V. Lyngby, G. B. Hardell and other progressive workers. Senator Cummins was introduced by President Keyes, who had been presented to the audience by Secretary Wallace. "I should toss 100 ballots out into this audience and the recipients should organize themselves into a senate, they would have a better senate than the senate down at Washington," declared Senator Cummins in his address. "I am not disparaging the senate of the United States," he continued, "but I am giving the people of Iowa their just dues."

This was a part of his arraignment of the men who are the leaders in congress and the men with whom Congressman Walter I. Smith aligned. "I can imagine," he said, "that I see Cannon and Aldrich and their friends, down on their knees tonight, but I can imagine that I see them tonight, praying for the return of Walter I. Smith to congress. "I had rather," Byers nominated, "a senator said in the course of his speech, "that to receive any honor that can come from the people of this state. I do not regret that there is a factional fight in Iowa republican ranks. I believe that such a difference of opinion is necessary in order to maintain the party's supremacy. As soon as all the republicans come to think alike, then will be the beginning of the end of the republican party."

The speaker referred to the primary law in Iowa. He said of the fight for its enactment. "We had to fight," he said, "and the progressives are entitled to the credit for that law. The stand-patters fought hard against it and didn't want such a law. In that fight one man towered high against it all the time, stood by my side and his voice mingled with mine in the campaign for the primary law. H. W. Byers, and to him great credit is due for the enactment of that statute. I can not now recall what Judge Smith did with regard to that law. He must have had an opinion, but if he ever lifted up his voice in favor of that law I didn't hear him.

Pioneer Settler Dies Suddenly. Special to Times-Republican. Iowa City, June 4.—Joseph H. Zink, one of Iowa City's first settlers, died suddenly of heart failure at his home here. He was past 70 years of age, and had lived here more than half a century. He was a civil war veteran.

His wife, three daughters and two sons survive. The daughters are Mrs. C. H. Morgan, of Oelwein; Mrs. H. R. Kennedy, of Redding, Cal.; Mrs. F. Hrdlika, of Iowa City, and the sons, Edward and George, of Redding, Cal.

HARDIN COUNTY CANDIDATES Making Final Round-Up of Voters—Several Close Contests. Special to Times-Republican. Eldora, June 4.—Political matters in Hardin county are becoming heated of some directions as Tuesday approaches. The principal fights will be for the offices of representative, sheriff, and county superintendent of schools, while the candidates for county attorney are making things lively.

The state ticket will get an exceptionally large progressive vote in Hardin county. The fight between Chase and Peterson for state senator seems decidedly in favor of Chase in Hardin. There are two progressives in the field for representative. They are Herbert Huff and Prof. Albert P. Styles. Both are well-known men. Thomas Walsh is out for a third term as sheriff. G. W. Parks, a deputy under Mitterer and also under Walsh, is opposing him. Charles L. Marks and George Heslop are candidates for the board of supervisors without opposition. The real fight will come later, when Prentiss Ransom will contest Heslop, Ransom being a democrat. The fight for county attorney is a sort of a three cornered affair. The candidates are Attorneys W. R. Williams and Charles L. Hays, of Eldora, and C. A. Bryson, of Iowa Falls. There remains but one other candidate to be enumerated. That is Hon. Charles E. Albrook for renomination as judge at the judicial convention. Judge Albrook will have no opposition.
