

PRIMARY CAMPAIGN NOW NEARING CLOSE

ELECTION TUESDAY WILL DECIDE NOMINATION OF REPUBLICAN CANDIDATES.

CONTEST IN FIVE OF THE TEN OFFICES

Polls in the City Open at 7 A. M. and Close at 8 P. M.—In the Country Polls Open at 9 A. M. and Close at 8 P. M.—Polling Places in the City—The Candidates.

The campaigns before the republican primary are rapidly nearing to a close, and the election on Tuesday, June 7, will determine the fate of the different candidates for offices for which there are contests. Five of the ten offices have contests within the republican ranks. The other tickets before the voters, democratic and prohibitionist, are uncontested.

In this city the polls will open Tuesday morning at 7 o'clock, and close at 8 p. m. In the country precincts and all other towns of the county the polls will open at 9 o'clock and close at 8. In the city the polling places of the different wards will be as follows:

- First ward—No. 204 East Main street.
- Second ward—Central fire station.
- Third ward—111 South First street.
- Fourth ward—South Third avenue police station.
- Fifth ward—Bohemia hall.

The Republican Candidates.

The candidates before the republican primary, in the order in which the candidates have filed with the county auditor, are as follows: Supervisors—Ode Lutteken, Edent; D. C. The Democratic Ticket.

The democratic ticket is complete, but with only one candidate for each office. It follows: Supervisor—D. S. McMahon, Logan; G. H. Shetler. Recorder—William Clemens. Sheriff—A. A. Gile, Turner Creek. Treasurer—William Parsons, Marion. Auditor—C. P. Pohle, Gilman. Coroner—T. C. Brady. Superintendent of Schools—Ella Langon. County Attorney—A. C. Daly. Clerk of Courts—E. M. McCarrten.

Prohibitionist Not Filled.

The prohibitionists are lacking in a few offices in their ticket, having no candidate for county attorney, none for recorder, and none for coroner. The ticket also contains only one candidate for supervisor, for the term beginning Jan. 1, 1912. The prohibitionist ticket as filed follows: Supervisor—H. F. Smith, Clemons. Sheriff—L. H. Hooker. Treasurer—G. W. Calhoun. Auditor—H. C. McLean, Washington. Superintendent of Schools—George H. Lewis. Clerk of Courts—Howard Nyce, Liscoomb. County Convention July 2.

The republican county convention will be held on Saturday, July 2, at the court house, where the delegates, who are to be voted upon at the Tuesday primary, will meet to select the delegates to the state, congressional, and judicial conventions. All of the township committees elected at the primary, who constitute the county republican central committee, will meet immediately following the county convention for the purpose of reorganization.

Young Hollander On Way Around World; Here Soon



GOTTFRIED RODRIGUEZ, Holland Newspaper Reporter, Circling the Globe, to Be Here Sunday or Monday.

Marshalltown will entertain on Sunday or Monday a young newspaper reporter of Holland, Gottfried Rodriguez, who is circling the globe in order to earn \$12,000 from his paper, the Amsterdam Telegraph, one of the two daily newspapers published in Holland. Rodriguez does music and drama as his daily stunt on the Telegraph and speaks five languages—Dutch, French, German, Italian, and English. The feat that the young Hollander has started out to accomplish must be finished in three and one-half years, according to the terms of his agreement. He has nine months to do this country, and has already been here four months.

Conditions of the Trip. The conditions of the wager are that Rodriguez must travel in the peasant costume of his native land, including the wooden shoes, tight fitting blouse, and large, flaring trousers. He must not carry any baggage, but may travel by any means excepting on a railway train. The young man must earn his own way, and this he does by lecturing on his travels. He has a motorcycle which is at present at Davenport undergoing repairs, but has become somewhat fearful of it owing to a recent accident. While Rodriguez may use his motorcycle on his journey he elects to walk, and most of the 18,500 miles

he has traveled so far have been on foot. On his travels Rodriguez has been collecting views of different kinds which he makes into stereoscopic slides. Left Amsterdam Over Year Ago. Young Rodriguez, who is 21 years old, left his native Amsterdam on Feb. 1, 1909, and traveled thru Holland, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, Russia, Germany, Austria, Hungary, Turkey, Greece, France, Spain, Portugal, England, Scotland and Ireland. He sailed for this country from Naples, working his passage on the North German Lloyd steamer Princess Irene. He landed in New York penniless and worked for two weeks in a candy factory to start himself on his coast-to-coast journey. He has visited over sixty cities in this country so far, and is now on his way west.

Rodriguez reaches Marshalltown from Cedar Rapids, where he visited today. In advance of him came Phil Reinsberg, of Quincy, Ill., son of a Quincy manufacturer, whose father thought a trip with the Hollander would be an education to his son and would provide him a good outing. As Rodriguez is not permitted to carry baggage Reinsberg is bearing some of the necessities that the young newspaper man uses. Rodriguez sends a weekly letter home to his newspaper, his story being about 10,000 words in length every week, and is descriptive of his travels and experiences.
