

OFFICIAL RETURNS MAKE NO CHANGES

SUPERVISORS COMPLETE CANNASSING VOTE OF RECENT PARTY PRIMARY.

TOTAL OF 3,607 BALLOTS CAST BY ALL PARTIES

Slight Changes Made in Some Candidates' Majorities by Official Figures—Prohibitionists Lack Sufficient Vote to Get State Ticket on Ballot—The Official Figures.

No change was made in any of the results of the recent party primary election, according to the official returns made by the board of supervisors in their check which has just been completed. A total of 3,607 votes was cast by all parties.

The head of the republican ticket received 3,498. The democratic candidates for governor got 163 votes, and the prohibitionists cast 84 votes for their candidate, who led the field in the party. The socialists cast fourteen votes for N. E. Wittse for representative.

Claude Porter was nominated for governor by the democrats.

The prohibitionists did not have a state ticket in the county because, according to the election laws the party did not have a large enough vote in the county last year to allow their state ticket to appear on the ballot. This prevented local prohibitionists from voting for M. M. Dickson, of this city, who was the party's candidate for lieutenant governor.

MRS. ANNA SMITH DEAD.

Former Woman of This City Dies at County Farm.

Mrs. Anna K. Smith, a former resident of this city, and the divorced wife of William A. Smith, 108 East Church street, died at the county farm at 2 o'clock this morning. Death was due to locomotor ataxia, paralysis, and a general breaking down. She had been an invalid, due to paralysis, ataxia and blindness for a number of years. Mrs. Smith became an inmate of the county farm on Oct. 29, 1909. Mrs. Smith's maiden name was Anna K. Highland. She was born in Cincinnati, May 15, 1846. She became the wife of William A. Smith at Milford, Ohio, and in 1885 they were divorced. Later Mrs. Smith married a Mr. Parker, of Colorado. The couple later separated and since then the husband has died.

After living in Chicago for a number of years Mrs. Smith came here to live. For the last seven years she had been an invalid, and for the past year she was unable to walk or care for herself.

Mrs. Smith has no living relatives, nearer than nephews or nieces, excepting her son, William H. Smith, of this city. The body was brought to this city and taken to the Simkins & Estel undertaking parlors, where the funeral, which will be private, will be held Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock. Rev. W. P. James will have charge, and burial will be in Riverside.

FIND INDICATES THEFT.

Valuable Women's Wearing Apparel Found in Box Car.

Valuable wearing apparel of some woman, which was found in an Iowa Central box car, near the plant of the Red Wing Union Stoneware Company this morning, indicates that some woman's suit case had been stolen, and the contents that were not wanted were left in the car. The suit case, grip, or valise which contained the articles found was not with the garments.

The clothing consisted of a silk dress, two silk skirts, one fancy white dress, shoes, underclothing and toilet articles. The clothing has an estimated value of \$49 or \$50. The find was reported to the police and the clothing was turned over to them, but they have received no report of any such theft and think the stealing was done on some train at some distant point. The clothing was left in the car during the night, as it is known that it was not there Monday.

ROUKER IS DISCHARGED.

Man Charged With Larceny Released—Mrs. Plavets Gets Money Back.

"Mike" Rouker, who was arrested on a charge of larceny filed by Mrs. Anna Plavets, was discharged by Justice Millard this morning. The case was heard last week. On the search warrant proceedings the articles which Mrs. Plavets alleged Rouker stole, which included \$19 in money, were returned to her.

It was Rouker's defense that the articles were his, having been given to Mrs. Plavets by him, and that she tricked him into courting her by pretenses that she was an unmarried woman. When he learned that she had a husband he became angry, and this was at least a partial cause for the trouble that developed later.

MOVE TO MARSHALLTOWN.

Louis Lovell and Family Come Here From Winterset.

Louis Lovell, wife, and son Gale, of Winterset, have come to Marshalltown to make their home. Mr. Lovell having taken a position with the Chicago Great Western in the local freight office of a company. The family will live at 203 Anson street. Accompanying Mr. and Mrs. Lovell is Miss Mary Chase, of Winterset, who will enter St. Thomas hospital training school to fit herself as a professional nurse. Miss Ella Chase, a sister of Miss Mary, is already taking training at the hospital.

Start For the Lake.

What is known as the "advance party" the elders who will prepare the camp for the boys of the Railroad Y. M. C. A., left this morning for Lake Frances, Minn., for a two weeks' outing. This party was made up of Physical Director A. B. Dawson, Fred East, Max Smith, Roy Myers and James Boucher. The boys of the party, under the leadership of W. B. Christy, will start for the lake tonight. The camp will be ready for them by the time they arrive. In the baggage car in which the camp equipment was taken was loaded the "pumpkin seed" canvas sail boat which Messrs Dawson and Charles Wassen have built for use on the lake.

Refund Mule License.

The city council Monday night adopted a resolution by McCarten refunding to the estate of C. A. Bowman the sum of \$101, the mule license on the old Andrew Bowman saloon from April 1 to July 1, 1910. Shortly after the payment of the license, Mr. Bowman died and his successor, Louis Bowman, paid the \$101 license on the same saloon for the same period.




