## AN IOWA BEEF TRUST

**FAMILIES OF SIXTEEN FARMERS NEAR LOGAN ORGANIZED FOR MUTUAL BENEFIT.**

**ORGANIZED TO KEEP PRODUCTS DOWN, NOT UP**

Each Member Furnishes One Young Beef Dressing About 400 Pounds—Cost Was an Average of 6 Cents, This Year's Basis—Proved So Successful That Others Follow.

Logan, June 25.—To keep the price of beef down, not up, sixteen families, with C. F. LeValley as president, organized a "beef trust" near Logan last season.

It was agreed among the members of this trust that each member should furnish a 2-year-old beef in prime condition, the same to weigh about 400 pounds when dressed; that one beef should be dressed each week and delivered to the members of the organization; that proper account of the weight and part should be booked; the weights to be used in final settlement with the member whose beef dressed short or over weighed the 400 pound limit, and that each member of the organization should receive a whole beef by the close of the season.

The butcher was to receive \$2 and the hide for his work of dressing and delivering the beef each week to the sixteen members. The butcher was to be given lodging and his team cared for where the beef was dressed and where noon oatmeal was given him while in the work of delivery.

At the close of the season a final settlement was made among the members of the trust, on a basis of 6 cents per pound. This year the final settlement will be made on a basis of 7 cents per pound.

This farmers' beef trust has proven so satisfactory that several other beef trusts among farmers near Logan have been organized this season.

**GREWSOME FIND IN ASHES.**

Discovery of Charred Human Bones in Debris of Burned Barn.

Ute, June 25.—Several weeks ago a barn on Mrs. Elizabeth Kee's farm, one and one-half miles south of this place, burned in the night, along with several horses and the season's supply of corn and hay. The fire was very mysterious and no plausible cause of its origin could be given, as the youngest son, Walter Kee, had returned from town about midnight and everything about the farm exhibited its usual contour when he retired.

A few days ago when the boys were clearing away the charred remains of the fire they were horrified upon the discovery of human bones, which clearly gave evidence that a human being had perished in the flames and had left but a few charred bones and one entire arm to furnish meager evidence of the tragedy so recently enacted.

Many varied and conflicting stories are afloat, many conjectures have been indulged and inquiries made for a possible missing person since the night of the fire, but of no avail. The mystery remains shrouded as deep as the night on which the conflagration occurred, and it is most probable that the true facts of the catastrophe will never be attained.

Officer Drew Gun and Fired, and Weed Was Hit—Shooting Occurred at Vallejo—Burial at Whittier—Family Formerly Resided East of Whittier But Later Went West.

Whittier, Cal., June 25.—Norman Weed, formerly of Whittier, is dead at Vallejo from a gunshot wound received there on the 15th inst. Weed, it appears, was assisting another man to resist arrest when the officer fired and Weed was hit. He will be brought here for burial. He was a native of Grundy county, Iowa, and was the son of F. E. and Ruth A. Weed. He is of a family of eight children, all of whom are living except one sister. The family home in Iowa was not far from Whittier. The father, F. E. Weed, died here some years ago, but the mother and some of the brothers reside here. One brother being Prof. John B. Weed, principal of the Bailey Street school, and a sister, Mrs. Ira Robinson.



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
