CAN'T STEAL LUCAS

STANDPAT SCHEME TO APPROPRIATE DELEGATES TO BE NIPPED IN THE BUD.

BOTH SIDES USED PASTERS IN ALMOST EVERY COUNTY

Attack on System in Vogue Would Throw Out Majority of Delegates to State Convention—Progressives Do Not Propose to Divide Counties—Railway Age Roasts Commission.

Des Moines, June 28.—It seems that after all the standpaters perhaps are not to be permitted to make a clean steal of Lucas county, as had been planned.

Some investigation has been made and it is found that the printing of stickers with squares on them was done in almost every county.

In one ward of this county, Polk, a dozen or more of the standpat ballots were cast with the voter forgetting to mark a cross in the square but the progressive judges said they would count them.

In view of the bold effort on the part of the standpaters to take over Lucas and Allamakee counties after they had been in fact carried by the progressives and their boast that they would send solid standpat delegates from every county where they have even so much as one majority in the county convention, the progressives are not disposed to be giving away any delegates just to show they are generous.

HOURLY LAW UPHELD

FEDERAL JURIST SITTING IN IOWA DECIDES RAILWAY SERVICE CASE.

ILLINOIS CENTRAL LOSES IN APPEAL TO COURTS

Company Attacked Constitutionality of Law on Thirteen Counts—First Decision by Any Court on Constitutionality of Sixteen Hours Continuous Service Statute.

Washington, June 28.—United States District Judge Page Morris, holding court in Iowa, decided that the federal law regulating the hours of service of train crews on interstate railroads was constitutional.

The attorneys for the defendant—the Illinois Central railroad—attacked the constitutionality of the law on thirteen different grounds. Their principal reliance, however, was upon the decision of the United States Supreme court in the employers' liability cases.

In its statement the commission says: "In the interpretation of the hours of service act, which limits the service of the train crew to sixteen hours in any twenty-four hours period, the court held that the performance by the engineer of duties required by the rules of the company in preparation for a trip during the half hour previous to the scheduled time for the departure of a train from an initial terminal, made such engineer 'on duty' during such period.

The case was a test case, the statement concludes. It was the first decision by any court upon the constitutionality of the law and the first judicial interpretation of its provisions.

In accordance with the agreement reached between railroad presidents and President Taft, United States District Attorney Charles H. Houts today, at St. Louis, asked for the dismissal of the injunction suit brought in the United States circuit court by the government against railroads composing the Western trunk line committee to restrain the proposed increase in freight rates.

Judge Dyer, who signed the restraining order at Hannibal, ordered the suit dismissed on District Attorney Houts' motion.

Fick, who was to have been the fourth member of the quartet to unite their fortunes.

Henry Fick left this locality two years ago and went to Canada where he secured a farm, returning here a week before the proposed wedding to claim his bride. He secured the marriage license several days before the wedding, and on the day before he was to have claimed her, left unceremoniously for his new home where it is reported there is a charmer with whom he proposes to effect alliance.

Dies of Ptomaine Poisoning.

Atlantic, June 28.—News has been received here of the death of Frank H. Cromble, formerly a well known business man. Mr. Cromble had been living for the past nine years in Washington state. It is supposed that his death was from ptomaine poisoning from eating canned meat. He came to

his home, suffering from this poison, having been engaged in inspecting some of his large timber tracts. When M. Cromble lived here he was in the lumber business with E. A. Shaw, who now resides at Dayton, Mo. The firm name was Shaw & Cromble. He was about 55 years of age and a native of Vermont.

Potato Pest This Season Worst in History of Webster County.

Fort Dodge, June 28.—A potato bug plague, the like of which has not been experienced heretofore for many years, seems to have struck Hamilton county this year and the farmers are kept busy fighting the pests. The battle must be waged constantly to keep the bugs from destroying the entire potato crop, and "paris green," "London purple" and other poisons used to exterminate such enemies to plant life are being sold in large quantities by the drug stores.
