LOCAL FACTORY TO BE MAINTAINED HERE

Branch in This City Will Be Devoted to Handling the Iowa Business - Freight Rate Advantages in Favor of Omaha Makes Opening of Plant There Advantageous.

Inviting proposals for paving certain streets and parts of streets, alleys and parts of alleys, as set forth in the resolution and amendment thereto passed on the 17th day of May, A. D. 1910.

Sealed proposals will be received by the city clerk of the city of Marshalltown, Iowa, at his office in Marshalltown, Iowa, until 8 o'clock p. m., on the 11th day of July, A. D. 1910, for the construction of the following described improvement, as per plans and specifications now on file in the office of the said clerk.

Paving South Third street from Main to Church street, same to be thirty feet wide.

West Nevada street from end of present pavement to east side of First street, same to be thirty-four feet wide.

South First street from south line of Church street to south line of Nevada street, same to be thirty feet wide.

Market street from west line of First avenue to east line of Second avenue, same to be twenty-six and one-half feet wide.

South Third street from south line of Nevada street to main line of the Chicago Northwestern railway, same to be forty-four feet wide.

West Linn street from Center to First streets, same to be thirty feet wide.

Alley from north line of Main street to south line of State street in block 12.

Alley from west line of Third avenue to the east line of alley intersections in block 12.

Alley from west line of Third avenue to the east line of the alley intersection in block 2, Anson's second addition.

Alley from south line of alley intersection in block 2, Anson's second addition south to the present pavement in the block.

With brick block pavement, about 12,700 square yards of paving, more or less, work to be fully completed on or before Nov. 1, 1910, if the weather conditions will permit, but should the same render the work inadvisable the time may be extended by the city council.

So much of the cost of the construction of said improvement as is by law assessable against abutting property and street railway having tracks located on said street so improved, to be assessed against the said abutting property and the property of said railway company, in accordance with the law governing the same, and payment to the amount of such assessment for such work will be made in assessment certificates, bearing interest at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum, issued in accordance with the provisions of section 841 of the code.

In case of any deficiency between the contract price and amount of such certificates, such deficiency will be paid in warrants drawn on the improvement fund available for the fiscal year beginning April 1, 1910, payable out of the proceeds of the tax levied therefor, and from no other source, the city to incur no liability other than the duty to levy the said tax and to properly apply the proceeds thereof, to making the special assessment above referred to and issuing assessment certificates to the contractor therefor.

The warrants herein provided for to be drawn as soon as the proceeds of said tax are available. Said assessment certificates and warrants, if such warrants be issued, shall be accepted by the contractor in full payment for all work done under his contract without recourse on the city of Marshalltown, Iowa.

Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check in a separate envelope, said check to be drawn on some responsible bank, in the city of Marshalltown, Iowa, and made payable to the order of the city treasurer of the city of Marshalltown, Iowa. In the sum of \$1,000. Each envelope must be addressed to the city of Marshalltown, Iowa, and endorsed with the name of the bidder and the improvement such check and proposal are for. Certified check accompanying proposals will be returned to the unsuccessful bidder when the contract has been awarded and also to the bidder to whom the contract is awarded when he shall have entered into contract for the construction of said improvement with the city of Marshalltown, Iowa, and given bond in the sum of 50 per cent of the contract price with sureties to be approved by the city council of the city of Marshalltown, Iowa, for the faithful performance of his contract.

The contract will contain a provision that the contractor shall guarantee the improvement to remain in good repair for the period of five years from and after the date of its acceptance by the city council, and the bond will contain a like condition.

In case the successful bidder shall fail to enter into contract with the city of Marshalltown, Iowa, for the construction of said improvement or furnish bond as herein required, and as required by law, the certified check deposited by him with his bid shall be forfeited to the city of Marshalltown, Iowa, as agreed and liquidated damages.

The right is reserved to reject any and all bids. The proposals will be acted upon by the city council of the city of Marshalltown, Iowa, on the 11th day of July, A. D. 1910.

ly displayed on the motor vehicle. Dealers may obtain a dealer's number, which may be used on any motor vehicle owned or kept or exhibited for sale by him, but every motor vehicle kept for hire shall have a separate, individual registered number, each as if kept by the owner for private use. Every dealer's permit shall expire on the 30th of June following the date of its issue.

I here desire to quote the law in full relating to the displaying of the number.

Section 1317-F Number displayed. Every motor vehicle shall also at all times have the number assigned to it by the secretary of state displayed on the back of such motor vehicle in such a manner as to be plainly visible, the number to be in Arabic numerals, each not less than three inches in height, and each stroke to be of the width not less than one-half inch, and also as a part of such number the initial and terminal letters of the state's name, in plain letters, to be not less than two inches in height. No person shall operate a motor vehicle on the public streets or highways without a number displayed as provided above, nor with any other number than that assigned to said vehicle by the secretary of state and registered in the name of the owner thereof.

The rate of speed in the closely built up portions (the territory of a city, town or village contiguous to a public highway devoted to business or where for not less than one-fourth of a mile the dwelling houses on such highway average more than 100 feet apart) shall not be more than 10 miles in six minutes, or elsewhere in a city, town or village at a greater rate of speed than one mile in four minutes, or elsewhere outside of a city, town or village at a greater average rate than twenty miles an hour. Upon approaching a crossing of intersecting public highways, or a bridge, or a sharp curve or a steep descent, and also in traversing such crossing, bridge, curve or descent, a person operating a motor vehicle shall have it under control and operate at a rate of speed not less than hereinafter specified, but in no event greater than is reasonable and proper, having regard to the traffic then on such highway and the safety of the public.

Every motor vehicle while in use on a public highway shall be provided with a suitable bell, horn, or other signaling device, to be so constructed as to exhibit, during the period from one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise, one or more lamps showing white light visible within a reasonable distance in the direction toward which such vehicle is proceeding, and also a red light visible in the reverse direction.

My attention has been called to certain of these provisions since publication that an effort would be made by peace officers and myself to enforce the provisions of the motor vehicle law in this county, and upon investigation that the recent death was caused from the failure of the driver of the automobile causing the death to comply with that portion of the law which requires lighted lamps between the hours stated above.

I hope the attention will be taken in the spirit in which it is intended, for I believe that it has come to a time when an ounce of prevention will be better than a pound of cure. At any rate, an effort to prevent by a timely warning the commission of a crime will be less expensive than an attempt to punish some person after some one is killed by the reckless use of a machine. I am.

LOCAL GROCERS FINED

Are Charged With Selling Misbranded Food Products.

Charged by State Food and Dairy Commissioner W. B. Barney with selling misbranded food products, to local grocers, John L. Inman and Wilbau & Halverson, were summoned in Justice Peck's court, where they pleaded guilty, and were fined.

Inman was charged with selling improperly labeled ketchup. Wilbau & Halverson were charged with selling essence of peppermint that was misbranded. In both cases the grocers sold the food products in the original packages in which they were put out by the manufacturer and they are protected by the wholesaler from whom they were purchased.
