

GYPSY FATHER GETS BACK STOLEN GIRL

KIDNAPED GIRL RESTORED TO FATHER AND ALLEGED KIDNAPER IS ARRESTED.

ELI BIMBOO, ANOTHER GYPSY, HELD ON CRIMINAL CHARGE

Bimboo and the Girl, Who Were Held Wednesday Afternoon, Were Released and Later Arrested Near La-Moille When Parents Filed Charge—Girl Held As Witness.

Held a prisoner and taken from place to place, while forced to give herself up to satisfy the whims and fancies of her master and alleged kidnapper and seducer, Mary Demitro, a 15-year-old gypsy girl, was released from captivity, and, although in jail today, will be returned to her parents. She wants to join her parents, Spedon Demitro and wife, who are anxious to reclaim their child, and who are also desirous that the law shall avenge her and them for the claimed wrong they have sustained.

Eli Bimboo who, it is claimed, has so greatly wronged the girl, is under arrest and in jail with a charge of seduction and debauching the girl lodged against him.

Released and Rearrested.

During Wednesday afternoon, after Bimboo had first been arrested, an effort was made by the officers to get the girl out of the wire and learn what Bimboo, the girl, and the band were wanted for. Des Moines could not be secured and the band was later released. When the father and mother of the girl arrived from Des Moines, the officers took up the trail of the gypsy band, following the issuing of a warrant for Bimboo. Constables Reed and Morse overtook the band about 10 o'clock a half mile east of La-Moille. Bimboo was arrested and the girl was brought to town to be held as a witness.

May Drop Case Here.

Bimboo engaged lawyers and, following his arraignment in Justice Peck's court, where he pleaded not guilty, a change of venue was taken to Justice Millard's court. No arrangements had been made up to noon to hear the case, and it is likely that Bimboo will not be tried on the charge. According to the girl the last of the ten miles south of Eldora, which would bring the case under the jurisdiction of Hardin county. A charge of kidnaping will not hold because that alleged crime was committed in Illinois.

Tells Tale of Brutality.

It is a story of brutal brutality that the girl tells in a comely member of her tribe, told in the jail. She said she was gagged and kidnapped, and that from Taunton, Ill., her kidnappers took her to Chicago. There and elsewhere, she says, she was forced to comply with the wishes of not only Bimboo, who is under arrest, but of other men of the party. Since then the band has been going from place to place in Illinois and Iowa.

Bimboo declares that he married the girl in Illinois. This, the girl says, is not true. The parents say that the girl is not married to Bimboo, and the father said he was willing to have his daughter decide with whom she wanted to go, her kidnaper or her parents. The girl told the officers that she wanted to return to her parents.

Claim Daughter Kidnaped.

According to Spedon Demitro, the girl's father, his daughter was kidnapped on the night of March 25, near Taunton, Ill., by a rival band of gypsies. Demitro's band was, at the time, camped near Taunton, and near the camp was another band of gypsies. During the night, Demitro claims, his 15-year-old daughter Mary was kidnapped, and nothing has been heard of her since until she was located with the band in this city.

Have Searched Country Over.

Ever since his daughter has been missing Demitro and his wife, Rosa, have traveled over much of the country seeking their daughter. They have followed clue after clue, but to no avail until he heard Wednesday that there was a gypsy band camped near Marshalltown. Demitro went to County Clerk Maher, in Des Moines, and asked him to communicate with the sheriff at Marshalltown, and determine if a girl answering his daughter's description was being held by the band. Shortly afterward Sheriff Nicholson and the police raided the camp and had the girl in their possession.

CONCRETE FOR SIOUX CITY.

They Get Down to Business Under the Commission Plan.

The Sioux City Tribune announces one of the business-like results of the commission plan recently adopted in Sioux City as follows:

"Concrete pavement, as satisfactory for all practical purposes as high priced standard pavements, will be laid on Sioux City's streets next year and the cost will be less than \$1.25 a yard. The city will lay 160,000 yards or more of the new pavement. Following a hearing of City Engineer Gaynor's report of his investigations by the city council and the paving committee of the Real Estate Association in the council chamber this morning, C. F. Lytle, of the Lytle company, and the Lytle Construction Company, in reply to an inquiry by Councilman G. B. Healy, superintendent of parks and public property, said that in his opinion the city can get bids for such work under \$1.25 a yard if it gives the bidding contractors to understand that it will have laid 160,000 yards or more of the paving.

REAL ESTATE MEN WANT IT.

Mr. Lytle attended the meeting as one of the members of the Real Estate Association. Other members present were George C. Call, J. N. Wood, J. A. Bondel and W. Stewart Gilman. No official action was taken by the council, its meeting being merely a conference and not a regular session. Councilman Healy suggested that Mr. Lytle prepare his report in written form and furnish approved copies to the councilmen, members of the Real Estate Association paving committee

and any other persons interested who might wish copies.

Mr. Gaynor's verbal report, made this morning, was identical in substance with the interview with him published in yesterday's Tribune. He went over his investigations in Windsor, Ont.; Detroit, Chicago and Minneapolis.

He said that the chief trouble with the concrete pavement in cities in which it has been laid is that too few expansion joints are used longitudinally and none were used longitudinally. He said he believed the cracking of the pavement could be remedied by proper use of expansion joints. These concrete streets in Windsor, he said, are much like Sioux City's concrete paved alleys, except that they are smoother, finer crushed rock being used on the surface.

"Mr. Gaynor made some mention of granitoid, the patent pavement used to a considerable extent in Chicago. Its surface is a mixture of two parts of cement and three of granite. Mr. Lytle wanted to know if Sioux Falls granite would not be as satisfactory. Mr. Gaynor said since it is harder it would be even better.

50 PER CENT FOR PATENTS.

Mr. Lytle made the remark that in purchasing patent pavement the city probably would pay 50 per cent for the pavement and 50 per cent for the patent."

SAW IT IN WINDSOR, ONT.

The Sioux City News says: "Concrete paving such as that which City Engineer Gaynor inspected at Windsor, Ont., costs 93 cents a square yard there and probably would cost about \$1.35 or \$1.49 here.

"The city engineer found that paving which has been down for four years had a longitudinal crack in spots. The crevice is being filled with tar. The cracking is believed to be due to contraction. The Windsor people do not use the expansion joint, although they favor it. The paving is composed of one part cement, two parts sand and four parts gravel.

"The principal handicap in Sioux City would be a lack of gravel, but crushed stone can be substituted.

"Mr. Gaynor at the annual convention of the American Civil Engineers' Society of Chicago, discovered that concrete is successfully used in many southern cities."

STANTON REGISTERS KICK.

Protests Against Payment of Election Board in Third Ward.

Because he alleges that the election board of the Third ward neglected to comply with the law in several particulars, J. E. Stanton, chairman of the democratic county central committee, filed with the board of supervisors a protest against the payment of the board for its services. The objections as to the board's work are set forth as follows:

"To the Board of Supervisors of

Marshall County: Gentlemen—I wish to call your attention to the illegal and irregular proceedings of the judges and clerks of the primary election of the Third ward, Marshalltown, Iowa, held June 7.

"First, this election board was organized contrary to law, as there was no democratic representation in either the judges or clerks, which the law requires.

"Second, no record was kept of the political preference of any of the voters, which the law requires.

"Third, no report was made of the committee elected at said primary other than the republican.

"Fourth, no report was made of the delegates to the county convention other than the republican delegates. The law requires this report to be made of all delegates of all parties.

"The work of this board would not be received or paid for by any business man in Marshalltown.

"I therefore protest against the payment of the following persons composing the board: D. S. Good, O. D. Ellett, V. E. Liebig, George Neil, G. R. Haas.

COUNTY CONVENTION CALL.

Republicans of County Will Meet in East Court Room Next Saturday.

The business to be transacted will be the selection by the convention of delegates to attend the state, congressional and judicial conventions, and to further transact such other business as may properly come before the convention.
