

CATTLE RECOUPLASSES

RECOVERY OF STEER MARKET WAS ALMOST AS RAPID AS PREVIOUS DECLINES.

PRICES NOW BACK TO CLOSE OF WEEK AGO

Hog Market Closed Bad, With Prices Generally Ten Lower and Packers in Control - Holders Anxious For Clearances Because of Approaching Holiday - Sheep and Lambs Steady.

(There was no session of the grain board today, adjournment having been taken until next Tuesday because of the holiday on Monday-Editor.)

Chicago, July 2.—Cattle was nominally steady. Recovery in steer prices has been almost as rapid as the declines in the early part of the week, so that prices are now back where they were at the close a week ago.

Packing operations at the principal centers show a rapid increase in the last few weeks. Instead of a decrease as compared with the corresponding weeks of last year, the slaughter of hogs is now showing an increase. There were 335,000 hogs cut up last week, as against 300,000 the previous week, 400,000 two weeks ago and 445,000 for the week corresponding to the present in 1909.

"Dullness and lack of outside interest have caused the provision market to mark time during the past week," says Schunbacher.

The hog run has been liberal to all points, dry weather and graduation of the young pigs to the bottle probably being responsible, as the receipts included many sows which were passed in July. The market is a large premium, as the stock will show a large decrease, for there have been at least 5,000 breds striped during the past month. We believe that little pork will be manufactured between now and September, and feel that this option should sell as high or higher than the market. For the present there is nothing to do but wait. If the hog receipts continue the market will work lower, but if they dry up again—and we think they will—buy September delivery of everything.

The market closed bad, with prices generally 10 cents lower. Packers were in control of the market. Holders of hogs were anxious for clearances because of the holiday Monday.

Nominally the market for native steers at the close of the week was in excellent condition. Country shippers are cautioned to make generous allowances for the outside influences which have been brought to bear on the market, however, and those who forget to take into consideration the facts that supplies here after the first day were cut down decidedly, while the buying was increased, owing to the fact that buyers had to take on a surplus of stock to carry them over a Monday holiday, are likely to suffer heavy financial losses.

Receipts Friday were placed at 2,000 head, including close to 500 Texas cattle direct to packers. These arrivals brought the receipts for the week thus far to around 43,000 head, against 57,915 head a week ago and 42,839 head a year ago. Shippers will notice that while receipts for five days this week fell only 15,000 short of the preceding week's run for the same time, nearly half of this week's supply was here Monday.

Both sheep and lambs went at steady prices.

Rains over a good portion of the corn belt revived interest that had begun to wane in feeding sheep and lambs, and the market has not been overrun with buyers. In any means, feeders have provided outlet for a large quota of the range stuff received, and competition from this source has helped sellers to sustain values. While killers lay much stress on the glutted condition of dressed mutton channels it is noted that they invariably begin to evince a keener interest in supply whenever any considerable portion of the crop that is of a really useful class for slaughter begins to move to the country outlet. For the good of the trade, therefore, both present and prospective, the western stockman should remember the corn-belt feeder buyer in his prayers.

CANNON'S CLOSE CALL

SPEAKER NARROWLY ESCAPED BEING DEPOSED IN CLOSING HOURS OF SESSION.

HIS SUBSIDENCE ALL THAT SAVED HIS HEAD

Cannon Good in Closing Hours and Failed to Arouse His Opponents—Some Insurgents Believed Cannon as Speaker a Valuable Political Asset in Campaign—Preferred Him to Smith.

[Special Correspondence.] Washington, July 2.—Speaker Cannon escaped being thrown out of the chair of the speaker in the closing hours of the session which has just ended by only the breadth of a hair.

How nearly the speaker came to being ousted has just become known. It was not known on the last day of the session, save to a very few men. The air was tense with expectation in the house, the last afternoon and evening.

The story of how close "Uncle Joe" came to the jumping off place would furnish the basis of a drama or a novel. It is a situation that has never before occurred in the history of the house.

Wanted Him For Campaign Issue. For two weeks before the end of the session, the insurgents had been conferring. It was difficult to agree. Some wanted to oust the speaker. Others did not want to try it.

Matters Allowed to Drag. The insurgents reached no definite decision and then along came the promise change in the rules for the alleged purpose of making it easier to get a measure out of committee when efforts were being made to pigeon-hole it.

Quiet On The Surface. "How peaceful everybody seems to be and how quietly everything is closing up," remarked a regular to his insurgent neighbor.
