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METEORITE FALLS NEAR MARIETTA

PARTY OF CAMPERS FROM THIS CITY SAY THEY SAW IT HIT THE GROUND.

FELL DURING RAIN STORM OF LATE WEDNESDAY NIGHT

Dr. W. M. Choate and Mrs. Choate, Also Other Members of the Party Saw the Fragment Glowing on the Ground But Did Not Make Close Investigation—Brilliant for Half Hour.

What is declared to have been a meteor or meteorite, or a fragment of one or some other celestial body, fell in an oak field on the John Timmons' farm, near Marietta, during the storm Wednesday night, according to eye witnesses who saw it strike.

While in their shack, a mile east of the spot, Dr. W. M. Choate and Mrs. Choate, also their nephew and niece saw the fiery body hit the ground.

Because of the storm at the time one of them went for a nearer view and early the next morning they returned to this city without investigation.

Accompanied By Awful Crash. As near as Dr. Cora Williams could estimate the meteorite struck about 10:30 o'clock during the heaviest part of the storm.

The four members of the party saw it after it struck the ground, where it lay glowing with heat for about half an hour before the light it gave out could no longer be seen.

Dr. Williams said today she thought the light that the body showed after it had struck the ground was three or four times as big as the headlight of a locomotive.

At first it was very brilliant but it gradually grew dimmer. The field where the meteorite is said to have fallen is a short distance west of the main line of the Iowa Central.

Local Weather Record. A lowering temperature, which followed the rain storm of Wednesday night, brought the coolest day of the summer Thursday.
