Filling of Cavities Being Done on Trees at the Norris Home.
Tree surgeons are at work on the big trees on the lawn of the D. W. Norris, Jr., home cutting cavities free of rotted wood and filling them with cement, trimming and otherwise treating infected wood according to the methods taught in the Davies Institute of Tree Surgery at Kent, O. ARRESTED; WANTS \$2,000
Benjamin Poduska, Lennox Machine Striker, Brings Suit Against Sidney Colomb, Secretary of Company for \$2,000 Because of Arrest.
An echo of the Lennox Machine Company strike found its way into the district court today when suit for \$2,000 damages was filed against Sidney Colomb, secretary of the company, and J. J. Mikshel, a foreman employed by the company, for the arrest of Benjamin Poduska, a striker. Poduska was arrested on June 22 for flashing sun rays into the office window with a piece of looking glass. A charge of malicious mischief was filed against Poduska, in Justice week's court. The case was assigned for hearing, but later the charge was withdrawn.
The suit is brought by Teresa Tanks, as the mother and best friend of Poduska, who alleges in the petition that he was "maliciously" arrested and disgraced.
ROAD SUED FOR ACCIDENT.
Nison Reider Files Suit for \$1,360 Against Great Western.
Asking damages of \$1,360, Nison Reider today filed suit in the district court against the Chicago Great Western, for alleged injuries and damage to the personal property of the Third avenue wagon he was driving was hit on the Center street crossing by a freight engine on Sept. 23, 1909. Negligence in operating the train and running at a faster speed than allowed by the city ordinance is alleged.
J. C. Winthorpe has filed suit against the Great Western for \$224.13, as damages on an oral contract for work, made by Roadmaster William Flynn on Sept. 11, 1909. Flynn was killed recently.
Daniel O'Connor has brought suit for \$130 against Great Western for the loss of a well drill, shipped from this city to Waterloo.
