BOARD MAKES RULES

STATE HEALTH OFFICIALS PREPARE TO COMBAT INFANTILE PARALYSIS. ISOLATION AND DISINFECTION SUGGESTED IN EACH CASE.

Des Moines, Aug. 18.—Following the meeting with physicians of the state, the state board of health adopted a set of rules to check the spread of the dread infantile paralysis, which seems to have gotten a foothold in Iowa.

The special rules laid down by the board are as follows: "All cases of infantile paralysis or suspected cases shall be reported by the attending physician or head of the family to the state board of health."

The state board of health recommends the quarantine of all cases for at least two weeks after the beginning of the disease and the thorough disinfection of infected premises after the termination of the disease.

It is a well established fact that the infectious material is found in the secretions of the nose and mouth of afflicted persons, and the board, therefore, recommends the use of sprays or gargles of one per cent solution of hydrogen peroxide to prevent the further spread of the disease.

These rules are for the purpose of preventing the spread of the disease in the state, which is the only measure the board can take, inasmuch as there is no known cure for the illness.

Experiments with monkeys have proved that the disease is contagious, hence the request of the state board that all cases of the illness be isolated and that perfect disinfection be had following a case of the disease.

This fact was brought out in the conference of the physicians and the board in the morning by Dr. Charles E. Decker of Davenport, a member of the board, and may be the starting of a movement to secure a complete revision of the state health laws at the hands of the next general assembly.

FRANCHIERE BEQUESTS

CEDAR RAPIDS MERCHANT GIVES FORTUNE TO CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS. ALTHO CATHOLIC IN FAITH GIFTS ARE COSMOPOLITAN.

Y. W. C. A., Home For Friendless and Home For Aged Women Among Institutions Receiving \$5,000 Each—Residue of Estate Goes to Sacred Heart Academy at Cedar Rapids.

Cedar Rapids, Aug. 18.—The late A. Franchiere, of Cedar Rapids, owner of a number of dry goods stores in Iowa, made generous bequests to charity and the Catholic church.

Mr. Franchiere did not die an enormously rich man. But he has left in his last will one of the noblest lists of bequests in the history of Cedar Rapids.

Mr. Franchiere was set on good things for he remembered so many of the good institutions of the city. He was cosmopolitan in his charities, as the following indicates:

Sunshine mission \$5,000. Mercy hospital \$5,000. Home for the Friendless \$5,000. Home for Aged Women \$5,000. Y. W. C. A. \$5,000. Church of the Immaculate Conception \$5,000.

St. Patrick's church \$5,000. And the residue of his estate to Sacred Heart Academy on Mount Farm.

Mr. Franchiere was a Catholic and he remembered the Catholic churches of the city and their hospitals and schools, but he remembered also institutions that are not under Catholic management such as the Y. W. C. A., the Home for the Friendless, the Home for Aged Women and Sunshine mission, which is an institution without a creed except the creed of doing good.

BARN AND STOCK BURNED.
