LeMars, Aug. 24.—While assisting in the work about a power corn sheller on her son's farm northwest of this city yesterday, Mrs. William Giffrow passed too close to the gearing of the machine and her hair, which was "done up loose," was caught in the cogs of an outside gear and then wound about a rapidly revolving shaft.

Within a space of time too brief to comprehend the nature of the accident or render assistance, the other workers about the machine saw nearly all of the woman's hair and a large section of her scalp torn from her head, thus releasing her from her awful position, but leaving a portion of her skull exposed.
