WILLS BODY TO DOCTOR

AGED MAN WHO KILLED HIMSELF IN NEBRASKA, FEARED BURIAL.
WANTED CRESTON PHYSICIAN TO DESTROY HIS BONES

A. Robertson, 80 Years of Age, Believed to Have Been Former Creston Resident—Nebraska Authorities Bury Body and Physician Fails to Secure His Peculiar Request.

Creston, Sept. 3.—Information received here yesterday, carried the notice of a suicide at Plattsmouth, Neb., of a man giving his name as A. Robertson, who claimed to have just come from here.

The authorities at Plattsmouth wanted information of the man. Dr. Coakley is confident he is J. W. Hauke, who was here about six months this summer, and worked in the harvest fields about the city. He had no relatives, was almost penniless, and was an old man, past 80 years of age. He often went to see Dr. Coakley and frequently told him he was going to kill himself. While here he killed his body to Dr. Coakley, in the following terms:

"Creston, Ia., June 22.—Having a horror of being buried since five years ago, and to aid surgery, I will my body to Dr. J. W. Coakley and son to be dissected, on this condition, that after they are thru, they destroy what is left, and not mount the skeleton."

The doctor does not believe the man was insane, says he was most intelligent, but owing to the force of circumstances surrounding him, had become despondent. Dr. Coakley is positive the man left here Monday for Plattsmouth. The officials at Plattsmouth buried the body there.

CRUSHED UNDER AUTO.
Two Women Fatally Injured While Visiting State Fair.

Des Moines, Sept. 3.—Mrs. W. R. Crow of Shenandoah, and Mrs. C. B. Cutter of Coia, probably were fatally injured late yesterday afternoon at Greenwood park when an automobile containing the two women and their husbands dashed backwards down an embankment and turned turtle in the ditch. The men of the party were not seriously injured.

Mr. Crow was driving the machine and Mr. Cutter was sitting in the front seat with him. When the car started to go down the embankment, the men managed to jump out but their wives were pinned under the car when it overturned. Mrs. Crow sustained a broken back and is seriously injured internally. Mrs. Cutter's left arm and hip were fractured and her back injured, when the tonneau of the car fell on her.

Mr. Crow and Mr. Cutter are both wealthy farmers. They came to Des Moines Wednesday, accompanied by their wives, to visit the fair. Yesterday afternoon they started for home, going out Grand avenue with the intention of passing thru Glenwood park.

PARALYSIS STROKE FATAL.
Prominent Hamilton County Farmer Suddenly Attacks, Dies in Hospital.

Webster City, Sept. 3.—Conrad Pfaffenbach, a well known farmer residing on the F. W. Entriaken farm three miles north of town, died at St. Joseph's Mercy hospital yesterday at the age of 44 years.

Thursday afternoon Mr. Pfaffenbach came to town with a couple of loads of hay, accompanied by his son, and while he was unloading at the Entriaken barn in the south part of town was stricken with apoplexy. He was immediately taken to the hospital. Soon after the attack the patient lapsed into unconsciousness and died without regaining consciousness.

He resided in Webster City and vicinity many years and was well and favorably known. He leaves a wife, one son and one daughter.

REMARKABLE RECOVERY.
Dumont Child Rallying From Exceptionally Malignant Case of Paralysis.

VICTIM A GRINNELL MAN
Body Found on Tracks at Van Meter Identified as That of James Martino—Had Been to Des Moines to Visit State Fair.

Van Meter, Sept. 3.—The man killed here by a Rock Island train has been fully identified as James Martino, of Grinnell. His father, William Martino, half brother, Perry Hallom, and brother-in-law, John Hodjka, arrived here and made preparations to remove the body to Grinnell. The supposition is that the deceased and Perry Hallom became separated in Des Moines on Wednesday and that Martino boarded the wrong train and stopped at Van Meter with the intention of returning to Grinnell. A stranger requested information regarding the train to Grinnell of the night operator towards midnight, and then disappeared.

DITCH CONTRACT AWARDED.
New Channel for Boyer River Eleven Miles Long to Cost \$75,000.

Denison, Sept. 3.—The board of supervisors of this county have let the contract for digging a new channel for the Boyer river between Arion and Dunlap to the Hamlin Construction Company, of Chicago, at a price of 6.47 cents per cubic yard. Bids ranged from this to 8 cents. The ditch will be eleven miles long and connect with a similar one in Harrison county. At the contract price the total cost will be about \$75,000.

Scourge Appears at Lake City.

HAMPTON HAS HOPES

NEW FACTORY PROJECT IN SIGHT FOR FRANKLIN COUNTY METROPOLIS.

Product of Company Now Manufactured in Marshalltown Under Contract—Removal of E. E. Clock and Headquarters From Grinnell Promise Better Things For Hampton.

Hampton, Sept. 3.—It is announced that another enterprise of a manufacturing nature may be located in this city in the near future.

The removal of Mr. E. E. Clock and family from Grinnell to Hampton and his locating here has given rise to the hope that the manufacturing enterprise with which he is identified may be removed to this city.

Mr. Clock has been residing at Grinnell for several years where he has been manager for the Grinnell Manufacturing Company, and has moved to this city in order to take a position with the law firm of Clock & Clock. He has been connected with the Modern Sales Company and the head office will be removed here as a result of his coming here.

The company is engaged in the manufacture of a power hammer, such as is used in many manufacturing plants, garages, repair shops, etc. At present the machine is being manufactured by another company at Marshalltown, but it is said that arrangements may be made to reincorporate the company and erect a plant here for the manufacture of the machine.

BIG PACK OF CORN.
Output of Two Vinton Factories Will Be 12,000,000 Cans This Season.

Vinton, Sept. 3.—The corn canning season is in full blast; both factories are now working from fourteen to sixteen hours a day. It is not generally known that Vinton has the largest corn canning factories in the state, if not in the entire country.

The Iowa Canning Company has a three line plant in Vinton, capable of packing 3,000,000 cans of sweet corn each season. In addition to this factory it has a three line plant at La Porte, and a two line plant at both Shellsburg and Garrison. The Vinton Canning Company has a three line plant in Vinton, with about the same capacity as the Iowa factory. These two concerns will pack at least 12,000,000 cans this season.
