PUSH CANVASS FOR CHURCH BUILDING

UNITED BRETHREN THINK GOAL WILL BE REACHED BY MARCH 1.

REV. C. E. PILGRIM IS DEVOTING TIME TO WORK

Mark Set is \$7,000 in Hand by March 1—Sum of \$4,000 Has Already Been Realized—Plans to Be Submitted at Conference Session to Be Held Next Month.

The work of pushing the canvass for the building fund for the new United Brethren church of this city is being prosecuted with vigor by Rev. C. E. Pilgrim, the pastor, and his assistants, and it is now believed that by March 1 the goal set will be reached. The new church will cost \$15,000, and the aim has been to have in hand \$7,000 by that date.

The idea of the building committee is to have half of the money necessary raised before the first shovelful of dirt is turned. With \$7,000 available the church erection committee of the conference will furnish the local church with \$2,500, in the shape of a non-interest bearing loan, to be paid back in five annual payments of \$500 each. The rest of the money necessary, it is planned, can be secured while the church is being built and on the day of dedication.

E. V. Fitzgerald, of Rhodes, a member of the building committee, will furnish the plans and specifications and build the church. It is expected that the plans will be ready for submission to the next session of the conference, which meets at the end of the month. The new church will be modeled after the Westminster Presbyterian at Waterloo.

Rev. Mr. Pilgrim will leave tonight for Iowa City, where he will appear Sunday in the interests of the building fund. Next week the pastor will work in the eastern part of the state, and on a week from Sunday will be at Muscatine.

During the summer Bishop Lenihan accompanied a party of American pilgrims in a tour of the Holy Land, which included a stop at Rome, where an audience was had with the pope.

On his return home Bishop Lenihan is to dedicate twelve new churches in his diocese. Six new hospitals have been erected and also schools and academies. The work is progressing very encouragingly, Bishop Lenihan said.

IS TRAMP'S TRADE MARK.

Disfiguring of Union Station Explained By Railroad Man.

A little story published a few weeks ago, which told of the disfiguring of the walls of the union station by painting on it in large black letters "A. No. 1" has been explained, in a way, by J. E. Flaters, of Winkelman, Ariz., who happened to see the story in the Times-Republican. Mr. Flaters, in a letter to the T.-R., says that it is a trade mark of a hobo, who has painted the letters on depots and railroad buildings throughout the west. Mr. Flaters says he has seen the mark on the Great Northern all the way from St. Paul to the coast and on the Southern Pacific from Portland as far south and west as Tucson, Ariz.

CLUB'S QUARTERS READY SOON.

Marshalltown Club's New Home is Rapidly Nearing Completion.

It is now expected that the quarters of the Marshalltown Club in the first floor of the Masonic Temple will be ready for the club in about two weeks. The contractor, who built the building has the first floor practically completed, all of the interior work, painting and finishing being done. The carpenters who were given the contract for building the partitions, which divide the floor into various rooms, have their work well under way. It is thought that in about two weeks all of the work will be finished. A part of the furniture for the rooms, which was ordered several weeks ago, has reached here.

Local Comment

When the board of supervisors and city council come to the point of determining the channel to be dug in order to straighten the river just above the dam, they should seize upon an opportunity to give Marshalltown a beautiful drive as an extension of its park system. By digging a channel south of the present river bed the dirt excavated would form a broad dike 100 feet wide or more along the shore of the new channel. Let Mr. S. W. Peche of the cemetery association, lay out the new channel with some graceful curves and landscape the boulevard. An automobile speedway on one side and carriage drive on the other with trees and clumps of shrubbery and a lawn extending down to the water's edge would make a beautiful spot for public recreation. In time this channel could be widened by public subscription, the old channel preserved and an artificial lake dotted here and there with wooded islands formed by the debris of the cemetery. A park circle should be formed where it stands. It would then be but a step to the northwest corner of the cemetery. Let the new riverside boulevard extend past the pumping station to the cemetery grounds, thence thru the cemetery and a drive to the country club. This is the dream of Councilman Clark and has been O.K'd by Mr. G. P. Kirby which is a guarantee of its practicability. All of us can not always agree with Mr. Clark's public policies but in this one Clark is certainly on the right track.

The general impression that there is a little money in Marshalltown seeking investment is about to receive a serious jolt from the experience of the Lemox Furnace Company, which has found a cash sale for almost half of its \$100,000 issue of 7 per cent preferred stock in about ten days time. No one has been personally solicited to buy. The company sent out its circulars and after thoroughly investigating it Messrs. French and Turner agreed to offer it for sale to their clients. All purchases were made voluntarily and several of the most careful investors in the city took some very large blocks of it. The time will come when every successful manufacturing enterprise soundly financed can find all of the additional capital it needs in Marshalltown to conduct its business.

Eldora this week let a contract for twelve blocks of concrete paving at \$1.25 per yard. The successful bidder was the same firm that is now laying concrete paving in Osage at \$1.39 per yard and it is the same firm that was in Marshalltown expecting to bid on concrete paving but went away without bidding because the specifications were loaded with a requirement for a \$50,000 bond with every bid before the contract had been awarded. Loaded specifications with hostile administration at the trigger did not look inviting in Marshalltown, but at Eldora the price is \$1.25.

The fact that the Marshalltown public schools won the second prizes for general and industrial exhibits at the Iowa state fair should be a source of much satisfaction not only to the teachers and pupils, but to the public in general. Marshalltown was in competition in the display with the numerous Iowa cities having a population over 7000 and in this large number the capital of the state, furnishing its exhibit at home and at a minimum expense and risk of damage, was the only city which excelled Marshalltown. The awards at the state fair in the school display pay a fine compliment to the Marshalltown schools, their superintendent, teachers, and pupils.

Mr. Brown, an advertising expert, who has paid close attention for several years to advertising in general and municipal advertising in particular, told Marshalltown business men this week why they should advertise their town, and how to go about it. Incidentally Mr. Brown told the business men that he could tell who were the live business men of Marshalltown by glancing at its daily papers. In other words the live merchants are the ones who are doing the advertising; the others are content simply to exist.
