BUGGY COMPANY TO EXTEND ITS LINE

MARSHALLTOWN CONCERN WILL SOON BEGIN MANUFACTURING AUTO TOPS.

OSBORNE BUYS GATES' INTEREST IN COMPANY

President of Marshalltown Buggy Company Acquires Vice President's Stock and Mr. Gates Will Go to Indianapolis to Manufacture Auto Tops—Top Business is Added to Buggy Factory.

Mr. F. E. Gates, manager of the Gates-Osborne Manufacturing Company, makers of automobile tops has acquired the interest owned by Mr. L. M. Osborne and has made arrangements to return to Indianapolis, Ind., where he will engage in the manufacture of automobile tops. He has rented factory space on the third floor of the new Fisher building in Indianapolis and will occupy it this fall.

Mr. L. M. Osborne, president of the Marshalltown Buggy Company, has purchased Mr. Gates' holdings of both common and preferred capital stock in the buggy company and is now making arrangements for his company to begin the manufacturing of automobile tops in the buggy factory. The top business was originally conducted in the buggy factory but owing to lack of room was removed to the present building on Second avenue and taken over by Messrs. Gates and Osborne individually. Since the purchase of the large warehouse on Railroad street the buggy factory's congestion has been relieved and now that Mr. Gates has decided to return to Indianapolis a complete automobile top factory will be equipped on the main floor of the buggy factory at the corner of Third avenue and Church streets.

LAUREL FARMER DEAD.

Simon Korsmeier Dies While on Visit—Death of Babe.

Simon Korsmeier, an old and respected farmer, living five miles southwest of Laurel, died Monday while on a visit to his daughter, Mrs. Irving Harter, at Chicago Heights, Ill. Mr. Korsmeier was in his 88th year and his death was due to paralysis.

Accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Harter, Mr. Korsmeier's body was brought to Laurel Wednesday and taken to the home of Mr. Korsmeier's son, William Korsmeier, where the funeral was held today. Interment was in the Evangelical cemetery.

The 2-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. B. H. Dankbar, living northwest of Laurel, died Sunday evening. The funeral was held Tuesday morning from the Catholic church at Haverhill, interment following in the Haverhill cemetery.

MOTHER SEEKS DAUGHTER.

Girl Held Here for Grand Jury Fails to Return Home When Sent.

Edna Bishop, the Oskaloosa 15-year-old girl, who was held in this city for a few days as a witness for the grand jury, failed to return home last night after being furnished with a ticket and put on the train by Dr. Rosa Liebzig who has had the girl in charge. When her daughter did not reach home, when she expected she would, the girl's mother boarded a night train and came to this city. Dr. Rosa Liebzig learned this morning that after the girl had eaten her supper at Grinnell, where the train stopped for half an hour, she left the station and is still supposed to be in Grinnell. The officers of that place were asked this morning to find the girl if they could and notify the police here. Mrs. Bishop is anxious that her daughter return home.

NORTH DAKOTA TO SHOW.

State Agricultural Department to Have Exhibit at Fair.

The agricultural department of North Dakota will have a large exhibit of the products of the state at the county fair. Arrangements were made Wednesday by a representative of the state's agricultural department to place on an exhibit which North Dakota has been showing in the state. After investigating many of the district and county fairs of Iowa the department decided to send the exhibit here because the local fair is the largest of the Iowa fairs outside of the state fair.

SLANDER IS CHARGED.

But Trial is Only For Evening's Amusement For Brotherhood Class. Charged with slander, in circulating defamatory statements against his pastor, S. W. Rubee, superintendent of the Methodist Sunday school, was placed on trial before the Methodist Brotherhood Wednesday night and acquitted by a jury.

The brotherhood was entertained at the church by Messrs. L. E. Matson, Clarence Mason, A. M. Myer, R. B. Silence, M. J. Boughton, C. E. Langdon, and Lee Atkinson, and following

a short business session a mock trial was announced as the evening's diversion. Judge Theodore Johnston, whose judicial mein had never before been appreciated, presided, and Dr. H. C. Mueller appeared for the plaintiff, Clarence Mason defended the action against Mr. Rubee, who was charged by Rev. Mr. Ellis with making false accusations against him in charging that he neglected to look after the members of the Brotherhood Bible Class. Damages in the sum of \$20,000 were asked.

The witnesses were examined and cross examined by the attorneys in the case, Thomas Stotts appearing for the plaintiff, and Fred W. Carl for the defendant. The jury, which was composed of Dr. W. S. Devine, Lee Atkinson, B. B. Silence, W. W. Hixson, W. B. Elliott, D. A. Carlson, C. Crellin, J. Q. Hall, John Spangenberg, H. C. Coleman, A. B. Coppock, and U. S. Bentley, returned a verdict of not guilty after being out a short time. The court officers who officiated at the trial were P. E. Arney, sheriff; George Coburn, bailiff; L. C. Hampton, clerk of courts; and H. A. Klisinger, court reporter.

While the jury was considering the evidence the spectators at the trial were treated to vocal numbers by Mr. George Milliker and Miss Adele Bishop Medlar, the latter instructor in voice at the Marshall School of Music.

WOMAN FRIGHTENS BURGLAR.

Takes Shot at Intruder With Revolver When Man Flashes Light.

A housebreaker was frightened away from the T. H. McCoy home, corner Main and Third streets, early this morning, when Mrs. McCoy, awakened by a light being flashed in her face from her bedroom window, fired a revolver thru the window. When Mrs. McCoy was awakened by the light, and heard the man working away at the window, she called to other occupants of the house, thinking that the burglar would leave when he knew there was some one in the house who was awake. As not caring to cease his operations, and Mrs. McCoy could not arouse the other occupants, she got a revolver and fired. The man beat a hasty retreat.

ENROLLMENT INCREASES.

Total of 2247 in Schools, Shows Only a Slight Decrease.

A revised enrollment of the public schools, as compiled from principals' reports by Superintendent Palmer, shows a total of 2247 pupils in the schools, as compared with 2267 last year on the same date. The pupils enrolled in the different buildings are classified as follows: First ward, 211; Rogers, 258; Glick, 270; Abbott, 262; Anson, 312; Arnold, 275; Woodbury, 256; high school, 393. In the high school last year on the same day there were 395 enrolled. This year there are forty tuition pupils in the high school and twenty in the grades.
