### WEDNESDAY'S CROWD MAKES NEW RECORD

LARGEST ATTENDANCE IN HISTORY OF FAIR, MORE THAN 10,000 PEOPLE.

ATTENDANCE FOR THREE DAYS AHEAD OF YEAR AGO

Prospects Were for Record Breaking Week Until Rain Fell This Morning—Fair May Be Continued Over Saturday—Features of the Events of Wednesday's Program.

All previous days' attendance records were broken Wednesday, and up to today the attendance and receipts for the first three days of the week showed a marked gain over last year and gave promise of establishing a new record for the county fair. Then rain began to fall this morning, continuing through most of the forenoon, cutting the attendance today by half or more, and possibly forcing the fair association to continue over Saturday.

More Than 10,000 Wednesday. The largest crowd that ever attended the fair on any one day paid admission into the grounds Wednesday. Not only did the city turn out splendidly, but thousands from the surrounding country attended, including the evening crowd. The attendance for the day was approximately 10,000 more than the largest previous day. The paid admissions for the day totaled 9,918. The previous record was made on Thursday of the 1908 fair, when the attendance was 8,289.

Shows Gain Over Last Year. Both the attendance and the gate receipts for the first three days of the fair were larger than for the same days of last year's fair, despite the fact that last year the first day was Labor Day and the attendance was good. The gain was all made yesterday. Up to last night the attendance for the three days was 14,237, compared with 12,732 for the same days last year, a gain of 1,504. The receipts were \$3,843.50 compared with \$2,411.00, a gain of \$1,432.50 over the same days a year ago.

With this showing made already the fair gave prospects of setting a new record for the week's attendance and perhaps increasing the paid admissions to 25,000 and the total attendance to 30,000.

Came Despite the Rain. Despite the rain today, which began falling about 8:30 and continued until 11:30, a larger number than was expected came to the city from the surrounding towns and country. Some of the morning trains were loaded, but the crowd was not nearly as large as it would have been.

Races Co in Straight Heats. With Wednesday afternoon's races were more in straight heats they nevertheless furnished pretty contests of speed for the thousands who packed the grand stand to its limit and lined the quarter stretch for a quarter of a mile.

Realize the hour's mare owned by E. E. Briggs, of Detroit, Mich., took down first money in the 2:30 trot. Out of a field of six starters she took first in each heat. Winkawanda, owned by E. R. Meyer, of Knoxville, 2:24 second.

Winners of 2:10 Pace. Although the racing owned by J. McLaughlin, of LePorte, won each heat and first money in the 2:10 pace, it was not without a sharp struggle each time. Silver Fox, the gray gelding owned by G. C. Anderson, of LeHays, Ill., crowded the McLaughlin horse all the time, but lacked a little in speed to carry it first to the wire. Little Nig got third money. There were but three starters out of a field of four.

### Features Worth Seeing at County Fair

Had the agricultural and fine arts buildings at the county fair grounds been doubled in capacity this year every inch of space could have been utilized. This is especially true in the art hall, where exhibits have been piled up six and seven deep, making it necessary for the superintendent and assistants to rearrange the exhibits a dozen times a day that all of the articles entered may be shown at least part of the time.

The big feature of the art hall exhibits is the showing of work of the city and country schools. This exhibit is well worth a trip to the fair in itself. The township schools have prepared a wonderful exhibit, which has been arranged and placed under the direction of County Superintendent Mary E. Huester and Superintendent Aaron Palmer, of the city schools. The exhibit consists of composition work, relief map work, product maps, drawing, metal work, botanical work, and work in other branches of study.

There is an elaborate display of fancy work this year and the showing of hand painted china, water color work and oil paintings, and burnt wood, is much larger than a year ago.

Agricultural Products. Considering the unfavorable reports of the fruit crop it would not be expected that the fruit display would be a record breaker, but nevertheless the exhibit is a very good one and some exceptionally fine fruit is shown, including fresh strawberries, just picked from the vines.

Several displays have been made from other sections of the county, a nice display being shown by the local people interested in the Koshkonong valley of Missouri.

No county fair is complete without the big pumpkin, and the exhibition is not lacking in this respect. Not only are the pumpkins large but the squash and other vegetables are also of enormous size. Potatoes are shown which are as fine specimens as could be found in this or any other county in the best years.

The housewife has more than done her share in making the fair a success, in bringing her best canned goods and the choicest products of her culinary skill.

Naturally the exhibit of corn and oats is of the highest class. Nothing else would fitly represent Marshall county. The showing of cereals is large and unusually fine.

Tuberculosis Prevention Exhibit. In a little tent on the main east and west driveway is an exhibit which is attracting the widest attention. This is the exhibit sent out by the state board of control for the prevention of tuberculosis.

The success of the exhibit has far exceeded the expectations of the management, as the tent was crowded all day yesterday and the literature furnished for the week's exhibition here was exhausted last evening.

With diagrams, statistics and charts, the board of control is endeavoring to show how consumption of tuberculosis may be prevented and how it may be cured.

Views are shown of the Oakdale sanatorium at Iowa City, and also of the Illinois state hospital for sufferers with tuberculosis. Devices are shown for preventing drafts in rooms and yet providing for air throughout the night. There are numerous diagrams showing the effect of the disease on the lungs. The exhibit was brought here from the state fair.

North Dakota Exhibit. The state of North Dakota has sent an elaborate exhibit to the fair, which is housed in a tent not far from the main entrance to the grounds. Here are shown the principal products of the state and a superintendent is in charge to describe the exhibit. The samples of the products shown are a fair representation of the average crop this year, it is said. These samples have been taken from all parts of North Dakota and none are from irrigated tracts or experimental grounds.

Included in the exhibit are samples of alfalfa, timothy, clover, corn and winter cereals.

An operation to drain the abscess was performed Wednesday afternoon, and the patient's condition is considered as satisfactory as could be expected.

Local Weather Record. Seventy-two and 52 were the extremes in temperature Wednesday compared with 69 and 51 for Tuesday. At 7 o'clock this morning the temperature was 54, one degree warmer than at the same hour Wednesday morning. Rain began falling about 7:30 o'clock this morning.

### WOMAN DIES SUDDENLY.

Member of Soldiers' Home Succumbs to Apoplexy.

Mrs. Mary A. Walters, a member of the soldiers' home from Cerro Gordo county, admitted Sept. 10, 1885, died suddenly at 6:10 Wednesday evening of apoplexy. Mrs. Walters had just returned to her home from the hospital dining room, where she had finished supper, and fell dead across her bed.

Mrs. Walters was 74 years old and was the widow of Samuel Walters, who was a member of Company I, Eighty-eighth Illinois Infantry, and who died in the army hospital at Nashville, Tenn., in March, 1864.

As far as known Mrs. Walters has living relatives, and at the time of her admission she gave Mrs. Frank Pardee, of Corwith, as her nearest friend. Mrs. Pardee was wired, but the telegraph company reported that Mrs. Pardee was now a resident of Long Beach, Cal.

Mrs. Walters' funeral will be held Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock, Rev. J. E. Stauffacher, of the State Street United Evangelical church, officiating.

### OPERATE TO REDUCE FRACTURE.

Unusual Condition Found in Case of Ethel Tellen of Gladbrook.

In order to reduce a fracture of the elbow in the case of little Ethel Tellen, of Gladbrook, the girl who fell from a swing several days ago, an operation was performed at St. Thomas hospital by Dr. N. E. Mighell, assisted by Dr. Charles Parton. The operation was found necessary because, after repeated efforts, the fracture could not be reduced. The joint was opened up, and the condition found was decidedly unusual, especially as to the displacement. The fracture was a serious affair in itself, and the tendon on the back of the arm had drawn to one side and lapped over the end of the bone of the elbow, making it impossible to reduce the fracture without going into the joint. The fracture was reduced following setting the tendon back in place, and the little patient is doing nicely, with every prospect that she will have a good arm again.

The sample electrolier that was placed on Main street before the Marshalltown Club closed a contract for the electroliers on that street, was yesterday presented to the Marshalltown Club by the McDonald Boiler and Iron Works, Des Moines. The electrolier will be used by the club at its new club rooms.


