COUNTY FAIR SETS NEW HIGH RECORD

DESPITE BAD WEATHER ATTENDANCE AND GATE MONEY MORE THAN LAST YEAR.

BELIEVED RECEIPTS WILL PAY FOR ALL EXPENSES

Thought That a Balance Will Be Left After Bills Are Paid—Total Attendance was 27,812—Gate Receipts Were \$6,291.55—Total Receipts Will Run Over \$8,000.

Despite weather which, on two days, materially cut down the attendance, the county fair, which closed late Friday, set another high mark for attendance and receipts, exceeding the figures of last year, which were the largest to date.

day, and several hundred exhibitors and persons who had concessions and others, all of whom had season tickets.

Of the receipts at the gates, \$5,076.15 was paid for admission tickets to the grounds. A total of \$1,216.40 was taken in at the grand stand.

Owing to the rain and cold weather the attendance at night was materially reduced, so that this department of the fair was not a very profitable venture.

The general admission for the night performances totaled 1,497, while the grand stand tickets amounted to 1,015. The total receipts for the night performances were \$324.

Total Receipts Over \$8,000. The total receipts for the week will amount to more than \$8,000 compared with \$7,600 for last year.

Other receipts not directly connected with the fair work, such as the assessment made on stock early in the summer, will bring the total receipts for the year above \$9,000.

Also there will be no way of telling what the expenses have been until all of the bills are paid, which will be several weeks. Secretary Clark believes that the receipts will take care of the expenses, and leave a balance besides.

How large this balance would be could not be given at this time.

Good Closing Program. The closing program of the fair was one of the best of the week.

It included the 2:15 pacing race, a citizens' race of half-mile heats for either pacers or trotters, two half-mile running races, an Australian motorcycle suit race, and a five-mile automobile race.

Both the harness events were good races, although both were won in straight heats. Harry Hamilton, owned by H. B. Farver, of Paw Paw, Ill., won the 2:15 race from a field of five starters.

Among the many stallion races, F. R. Ensminger, of Gilman, got second money; Dexter Crattan, owned by J. McLaughlin, of La Porte, third; and Della Wood, owned by H. S. Helphrey, fourth money.

Home Made Car Wins. A car, numbered "31" assembled by the Johnston Automobile Company, and carrying an engine which was built outright at the local garage, won the five-mile automobile race by almost three-quarters of a mile from the Mitchell, driven by Fred Yordy.

Hardy Friend, driving a Kissel Kar, withdrew after a few laps. The Johnston car was driven by W. W. Johnston and showed remarkable speed. It did the five miles in 7:41.

Hubler Wins Motorcycle Event. Seven motorcycleists entered in the Australian pursuit race, for prizes of \$15, \$10 and \$5. The handicaps given the riders varied from one-eighth to three-eighths of a mile.

I. E. Hubler, riding from the scratch, won the race, catching J. B. Miller, who was second place after going three and one-half miles. Ernest Kinsey got third money. The time was 1:03.3 and three and one-half miles was not taken.
