TAX LEVY IS LOWER
County Levy for 1911 is 11.7 Mills as Against 12.9 Mills For This Year—General Insane and Insane Building Funds are Eliminated.
The board of supervisors this morning made the county tax levy to be paid in 1911, for the carrying on of the business of the county for the coming year. The levy is 11.7 mills as against 12.9 mills made last year and paid this year. The insane building fund, levied last year by vote, is eliminated this year, as is also the general insane fund of 2 mills. The county insane fund has been increased one-half mill, however. The bridge fund has also been increased one-half mill, and the other items making up the list remain the same.
The state levy this year is also lower than that of last year, being 3.8 as against 4 mills in 1909. This makes the total state and county levy for 1910, 15.5 mills as against 16.9 mills last year, or an increase of 1.4 mills.

DR. BLANCHE DEAD.
Former Packing House Inspector Dies at Blairstown.
News reached the city today of the death at Blairstown, Sunday, of Dr. Richard J. Blanche, a former resident of this city, who was for two years prior to six years ago, government meat inspector at the Brittain & Co. packing house. Death was due to tuberculosis of the lungs. The funeral was held at Conrad Tuesday, the burial being with Masonic honors.
Dr. Blanche was born and reared in Conrad. He was 38 years of age. After leaving here he went to New Mexico, where he was territorial inspector for the government. A few months ago he moved to Blairstown where he was practicing. In addition to his wife and two children he is survived by his parents, two brothers and three sisters. MAYOR EDWARDS ACQUITTED.
Suit instituted by Shannon City Parties Thought to Be Spite Work.

Creston, Sept. 21.—The trial of Mayor Edwards, of Shannon City, which was held here before a jury trial in a justice's court, resulted in acquitting him of the charge of veterinary practice without a license. While he admitted that he sometimes doctored sick animals, yet he made no pretense of practicing. The action was brought by Mr. Loomis, of Shannon City, the father of one of the veterinarians of that place, and it is alleged to be the result of spite.
MONEY DOESN'T COME.
Iowa City Man Taking Steps to Secure Danish Inheritance.

Iowa City, Sept. 21.—Knut Knutson, of Iowa City, is investigating the non-arrival of an inheritance of \$3,000, which is awaiting him in Denmark. Three years ago his mother died, leaving him an orphan, and entitled to the sum above mentioned. He began at once to make efforts to secure the money, but nothing came of them, and he fears that something has gone wrong with the inheritance, here or abroad. He will take the matter up with attorneys through the Danish consul.
Takes Acid By Mistake.
Keokuk, Sept. 21.—Lemuel McAndrews the veteran attendant at the sluiceways of the government canal at the middle lock, had a narrow escape from death last night. For a long time he has been associated with the canal work and makes his home at Sandusky. There were rumors afloat this morning that he had attempted to take his life, but these reports are absolutely without foundation. He simply made a mistake, taking carbolic acid when he believed that was administering whiskey to himself. His lips, mouth and throat were very badly burned.
