ARCHITECT SAYS HOSPITAL IS O. K.

MAYBERRY COMES TO DEFENSE OF NEW COUNTRY BUILDING'S CONSTRUCTION.

DESIGNER SAYS STRUCTURE IS ACCORDING TO CONTRACT

Defends Work of the Contractor and Answers Criticisms Made in the Recent Report of the Grand Jury—Declares the Building is Being Honestly Built—Mayberry's Letter.

R. R. Mayberry, of Cedar Rapids, the architect, who drew the plans and prepared the specifications for the county's hospital now being built at the county poor farm, in a letter addressed to the board of supervisors, comes to the defense of the contractor W. L. Longcor, and assures the board and the county that the building is being properly constructed and is being built according to contract.

Is According to Contract. Mr. Mayberry has had general supervision of the construction, he having visited the building from time to time. The grand jury found fault with the manner in which the walls were bonded, the anchoring of the floors, the setting of door jambs, the supporting girders over openings and exposed reinforcing rods. Mr. Mayberry says these details are correct according to contract.

Walls Properly Bonded. In his letter Mr. Mayberry answers these criticisms, taking them up one by one. His communication is as follows: "I have made a very careful investigation of the report of your grand jury in regard to the new building which is being built at the county farm.

"In Article 1 of this report the grand jury say that the hollow tile for the inside walls, and the inside and the outside wall are not properly laid up or bonded together; also that cross walls and floors are not properly anchored to the outside walls and the center girders are laid over openings five feet wide without proper supports; and that the inside door jambs are set and should not be until after the plastering was done and dry.

"Now, in regard to the hollow tile walls, I will say that on my monthly trips to this building during the erection of these walls, I found all walls properly bonded and where the tile themselves were not bonded into the walls, that galvanized metal bonds were used which are conceded by all mechanics to be equal to as good as bonding the tile, but in the majority of all cases the tile are bonded at least every third tile in height.

Answers Criticism of Floors. "In regard to the floors not being properly anchored to the outside walls, I will say that these floors in all places on all outside walls have a bearing of from four to six inches on the walls and the walls for the next story above are laid directly on the edge of these concrete floor joists and form a bond from which there can absolutely be no chance of the floors and walls separating.

"In regard to the inside door jambs, where the plastering is returned to the jambs as is the case with all inside and outside doors in this building, it is absolutely necessary to set these jambs before the plastering is done, as it would be impossible in any other way to secure a mechanical joint where the plaster joins the jambs.

"In regard to the girders being laid over openings five feet wide, and proper supports, I will say that I fail to see how your honorable grand jury could arrive at the conclusion that they were not properly supported when these girders are resting on a concrete beam, twenty inches in height and nine inches in thickness, properly supported at the edge on the tile walls and each of these girders are reinforced with six iron rods and their carrying capacity will figure at twenty tons per each girder on a factor of four for safety, and figuring the load that these girders have to carry, I find that they only carry a load of about five and one-half tons when the floors are loaded at 200 pounds per square foot, which is more than your load will ever be, and this still leaves you a working safety of fourteen tons or more on each of these girders.

Praises The Builder. "Now in regard to Article 2 where they say they find some of the rods for reinforcing the concrete floors are turned up inside of the walls. I find on careful investigation that there are five or six of these rods turned up as indicated in the report, but they come over a very small room where the span is only about six feet, and even if there were no rods at all in this floor over this room the floors would stand three times the weight which they are intended to carry, and as long as there are only three or four of these rods turned up and all other rods are anchored properly, there is no cause for complaint on this account.

"I have found in all my dealings with Mr. W. J. Longcor, that he wishes to give the county everything that the contract calls for, and in my inspections of the work he has shown a disposition to cheerfully remedy any defects which I have noticed and called his attention to and I can assure the board and the grand jury that the erection of this building is entirely satisfactory to myself as far as the work has progressed and I have no doubt that the work will continue to be finished in as satisfactory a manner as it has in the past, and I would further say that the board of supervisors and people of Marshall county need have no fear that they are not getting what their contract calls for in this building."

ROOMS OPEN TO MEMBERS.

Marshalltown Quarters Are Now Ready For Inspection. The new quarters of the Marshalltown Club are now open for the inspection of its members. The formal opening will probably be held some time next week. The handsome new quarters have attracted a number of members today. A meeting of the board of directors will probably be held this evening to determine the date of the formal opening. The members of the club are welcome to visit the rooms.

QUARRY CLOSES: 150 OUT

Northwestern Shuts Down Stone Quarries at Quarry and 150 Are Thrown Out of Work—Reason For Shut Down Not Given. The Northwestern railroad unexpectedly shut down work at its quarries at Quarry Friday evening, and as a result about 150 laborers, who have been employed there all summer, were thrown out of work. The reason for this shut down could not be learned when inquiry was made at Quarry today. Most of the laborers are foreigners, who were brought from Chicago.

Local Comment

The boosters at Belle Plaine who promoted a \$10,000 creamery for the good of the town now have the satisfaction of seeing the building almost completed. Marshalltown can have one go after it. When running it will easily pay out \$100,000 per annum in cream checks.

Mr. Mack has announced that he is ready with his charts in response to the council's insistence under resolutions and ordinances introduced by Herman. The council should meet immediately to receive them for after six weeks of explanation in order to obey the ordinances of the city is an event to be celebrated. But there is more need for prompt action. The question will arise, are the charts complete and sufficient? The Herman ordinance calls for a complete engineering plan. This means the information necessary to locate exactly every tap and house service. For years plumbers have been unable to find city records from which they could quickly locate house services and the result has been that their maps were set to digging until they found the pipes, all at the expense of the property owner. Only this week a drayman in the city was compelled to pay for a full day's time of a plumber's helper digging several holes of exploration in order to locate a service which should have been located from measurements on file in Mack's department. The people pay every day for this neglect to keep the records of the sewer and water department as they should be kept and the time has come to get rid of that fellowship and get down to business.

Years ago very complete plans were made of the original sewer and water mains and they were later revised to date by William Bremner. It has been since Mack's administration that this work clearly demanded by the ordinances has been neglected. Mack once lost his job largely because of his failure to keep these records and when Councilmen Abbott, McBride and Webster secured his resignation it was on the express understanding that he would prepare and keep these records right. Local plumbers are ready to show that they have turned in their data and it remains to be seen whether Mack has received the information. Then again measurements from the "lot line" have in some cases been found to be from the inside of the sidewalk, in others from the outside of the walk and in others from the curb line. It is Mack's business to establish uniformity in these records and to keep data on file for the benefit of the public.

Then what is the city council going to do about \$1,500 worth of sewer pipe stolen or sunk thru the floor? Competent business engineers who were called in to inspect the pipe that was there at ten car loads. Tony's resolution was that Mack's duty to look after the pipe. The pipe is now gone. Who is to blame and what is going to be done about it?

Concrete paving is actually being laid in Marshalltown but it is an emergency job not up to proper requirements in either price or specifications and yet will probably prove to be a fair sort of a pavement. In the first place the base or foundation is mixed 4 of cement and 1 of sand where the proper mixture is 1:3:5 of cement, sand and stone. This gives a 1:3 mortar instead of 1:4 which is much stronger, while by pouring in five parts of crushed stone a stronger base is secured at less cost than when all mortar is used. And on the top is laid only 1 1/2 inches thick where the proper pavement should have a two-inch top. The price of \$1.50 per yard after deducting for curbs figures about \$1.42 per yard. On a small job of this kind no complaint need be raised at the price but it should be noted that Eldora is laying street paving at \$1.36 per yard with the 1:2:5 base which is a 1:2 mortar as compared to our 1:4 and with a two inch top as compared with our 1 1/2 inch top. Davenport, too, is paving her alleys one-half inch thicker than ours at \$1.12 per yard. These figures should be kept in mind for next year.

A neat and ever present problem of gas and electric rates in this city comes the information from Cedar Rapids that the gas plant which the owners said had cost \$267,000 to build and on which the rate paid could not be earned at 90-cent gas has now been sold for \$1,000,000, with the 90 cent ordinance still intact and two state court decisions in its favor. It will also be remembered that a certain witness in that case testified that gas could not be sold in Cedar Rapids at a fair profit and yet at 85 cents the Chicago company has been paying seven per cent dividends and the Chicago city council has just appropriated \$10,000 with which to investigate the cost of gas there with a view to cutting the rate. The company here in court claims that the \$1 gas will not yield an adequate return and yet an alleged purchaser offered to come to it in four years from now in return for a franchise.
