SNUB FOR SOLDIERS

IOWA NATIONAL GUARD AND SPANISH WAR VETERANS HAVE GRIEVANCE.

CLAIM SHABBY TREATMENT AT DES MOINES TOURNEY

Even General Lincoln Not Invited By Management, Nor Any Officers of National Guard — Slight Noticed By General Smith and Staff Officers, Who Personally Issued Invitations.

Des Moines, Oct. 6.—Members of the Iowa National Guard and Spanish war veterans are severely criticizing what they term the "shabby treatment" shown the regular officers and soldiers from various western army posts here during the recent military tournament here. Members of the guard and the vets were making an attempt to keep the discussion and criticism of the local tourney committee a secret, but the affair has leaked out.

It was argued by different members that not one solitary effort was made to entertain the enlisted men of the army, altho nearly \$1,100 of the tournament receipts were spent by the Hyperion Club in entertaining the officers.

Another grievance which found considerable criticism was the fact that none of the national guard officers of the city or state were invited to assist in the entertainment of the city's guests or even in making arrangements.

James Rush Lincoln, who commands the Iowa troops, it is said, was not even invited and General Smith, who had charge of the tourney, noticed this, and to relieve the embarrassment himself issued an invitation to General Lincoln. Other members of General Smith's staff, it is claimed, noticed the state of affairs, and secured tickets themselves to send to their friends in the National Guard.

The enlisted men, according to some of the Spanish vets, were registering kicks because no attempt was made to entertain them, altho it is said other cities had taken care of them with big smokers.

H. H. Polk, president of the Interurban line, and Geis Botsford, secretary of the Commercial Club, had the local entertainment in charge.

DEMOCRATIC LOVE FEAST.

Porter Opens Northern Iowa Campaign Under Apparently Favorable Auspices Special to Times-Republican.

Mason City, Oct. 6.—The democrats of northern Iowa opened their campaign here last night. The gold demagogues and the anti-Bryan democrats have all gone back into the wigwag, and there was quite a love feast as a result. J. E. E. Markley, who presided over a number of years, presided over the meeting. Col. J. H. McConlogue, at one time democratic candidate for secretary of state, and John Cleggitt, the foremost citizen of northern Iowa, were all prominent at this meeting.

Judge Wade spoke very briefly after the introductory remarks of Chairman Markley, while Mr. Porter made the set speech of the evening, varying but little from the points argued at the opening at Sioux City. Altogether it was the most successful meeting the democrats have ever held in the city. Republicans are not yet aroused from the apparent lethargy into which they were thrown by their own domestic difficulties. As yet no plans have been made to arouse the vote and get it out, and election day only four weeks distant.

They go to Kansas City with the full intention of winning at the Royal show and all men on the Royal team are eligible for the international to be held in Chicago in November. Iowa has cleaned things up pretty much all over for several years and Professor Kennedy will go to the international this year with one of the strongest teams that he has ever coached.

FIRST DISTRICT MEETINGS.

Plans to Be Made For Campaigns in Seventh, Tenth and Eleventh. Special to Times-Republican.

Des Moines, Oct. 6.—Arrangements for holding a meeting of the republican congressmen, member of the state committee, legislative candidates, county chairmen and congressional committeemen in each of the three Iowa districts where no meetings have been held during the present campaign were completed by Chairman C. During the early part of the evening he was seen in the company of Sherman Abbott, who was taken custody by the police during the night. The officers suspect him of knowing something about the robbery. Martin was intoxicated.

BIG YIELD OF CORN.

Story County Farmer Gathers From Field Going Ninety Bushels to Acre. Special to Times-Republican.

Nevada, Oct. 6.—Chris Nelson, a well known farmer living just north of the city limits, went out into one of his corn fields Tuesday afternoon and picked a load of corn for feeding purposes. PARENTS OF MISS ETHEL MORELAND, FRANKLIN COUNTY, NEARLY DISTRACTED.

LAST SEEN IN DEPOT WITH YOUNG STRANGER

Man Bought Tickets But Short Line Agent Fails to Recall Destination Owing to County Fair Rush — Girl, Aged But 17—Missing For Week — Reward Offered.

Iowa Falls, Oct. 6.—Where is Ethel Moreland? Did she elope with a new-found affinity? These are the questions that are being asked by the relatives and friends of the young lady, and, failing to receive a satisfactory answer, appeal has been made to the police of this city to help locate the missing girl.

Last week, to be exact, Sept. 29, Miss Moreland, who is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Moreland, of Lee township, Franklin county, left home with some neighbors to attend the county fair at Hampton. The last seen of Miss Moreland was in the Short Line depot at Hampton, in company with a young man who bought tickets, but in the rush of fair traffic the agent can not recall to what point he sold the young couple their tickets. The presumption is that they left Hampton on a train south-bound at 6.40 in the evening.

The father of the missing young lady states that she was not keeping company and that the young man she was with at Hampton was a stranger to the neighbors who knew Miss Moreland. She is nearly 17 years old and a very prepossessing young lady. She has dark hair and eyes, and a fair complexion. She is about five feet four or five inches in height. In hopes that the police can locate the missing girl and place her in communication with her parents, who are almost distracted over her disappearance, the father has offered a reward of \$50. No reason is known why she should leave home, as she was, apparently, perfectly contented.

Oakland. The death of Rev. L. H. Thompson occurred at the home of his daughter, Mrs. John H. Spauld, in this city, Sunday afternoon. Rev. Mr. Thompson was a resident of Oakland for many years. He was 79 years old.

Franklin. With the finest of weather, the German Evangelical congregation celebrated its sixtieth birthday anniversary for which occasion the large building had been finely decorated with ferns and other potted plants.
