## DOOLITTLE RESIGNS AS CLUB SECRETARY

WILL ENTER FIRM OF E. E. BENEDICT & CO., WITHIN FEW WEEKS.

RESIGNATION HANDED TO CLUB WEDNESDAY NIGHT

No Action is Taken By Executive Committee, and Club Has No One in View as Successor--Will Cast About For Man Trained in Advertising Business.

At a meeting of the executive committee of the Marshalltown Club, held at the club rooms Wednesday night, Raymond W. Doolittle, secretary of the club, handed in his resignation, effective as soon as the club can secure someone to fill the position. While no formal action was taken on the resignation, it is understood that action is to be taken soon, that Mr. Doolittle's plans for the future may not be interfered with.

Mr. Doolittle leaves the service of the club in order to engage in business within the next month or six weeks he will associate himself with his father-in-law, E. E. Benedict, in the firm of E. E. Benedict & Co. The firm of E. E. Benedict, Peek & Co. is to be dissolved, Mr. Peek retiring because of a desire to take up farming. The business of E. E. Benedict & Co. which was the name of the concern until Mr. Peek entered the firm a year or more ago, is to be incorporated, and Mr. Doolittle is to take stock in the company, and assist in the management. Another stockholder, E. H. Hering, who has been in the employ of the Benedict company for twelve years.

Will Look For Advertising Man. While the club as yet has no one in view as Mr. Doolittle's successor, it is the sense of the executive committee that as long as a change is necessary, the club cast about for a secretary in the person of some man who has had experience as a promoter, or one who has been trained along advertising lines. It is believed that the best interests of the club can be served in this way.

Peek's Plans Indefinite. Mr. Peek's plans, upon retiring from the firm with which he has been employed for several years and associated for the past year, are as yet indefinite. Mr. Peek's health has not been good for some time and he has been desirous of getting out of doors more and engaging in farming. Mr. Peek has a tract of twenty-seven acres on Summit street, and expects to dispose of this and buy a larger farm. It is possible that he may move to western Kansas where Mrs. Peek's parents live, and engage in stock raising.

### SHOE STORE TILL ROBBED.

J. E. O'Brien Store Entered and \$5 is Stolen From Cash Drawer. A burglar or burglars entered the J. E. O'Brien shoe store, 26 East Main street some time Wednesday night, opened the cash drawer and stole from it \$5, the change that had been left when the store was closed in the evening. Entrance to the building was gained thru the transom over the front door. The transom had been left partly open. Wire screening that was nailed to the outside of the frame of the transom had been pulled loose, leaving an opening large enough for a man to crawl thru. The transom is seven feet or more above the entrance door and it is probable that the burglar who got in was aided in climbing over by a confederate. The theft was discovered by Mr. O'Brien when he noticed that some one had rung up a sixty cent sale after he had closed the cash register. Forty or fifty pennies, which were in the drawer, were not taken, and as far as the owner is able to judge none of the stock is missing and no effort was made to break into the desk, which contained cash. The burglary was reported to the police after the theft was discovered this morning.

### READY FOR GYMNASIUM WORK.

Schedule For Y. M. C. A. Physical Classes is Prepared. The gymnasium classes of the Railroad Y. M. C. A. will begin their season's work next week. The schedule for the classes, the first of which meets next Monday has been prepared by Physical Director R. J. Guyer. The day intermediate class meets Monday and Wednesday afternoons at 4:15. The night intermediate class meets Monday and Wednesday evenings at 7. Juniors meet Wednesday afternoons at 4:15 and Saturday mornings at 9:30.

### RUNNING TEAMS TO MEET.

Cross Country Run Planned For Y. M. C. A. Teams. A cross country race between running teams of the local and the Waterloo Y. M. C. A. is being planned by Physical Director R. J. Guyer of the Y. M. C. A. and the Waterloo association's physical director. Each association will probably enter a team of five or six men. The date for the event has not yet been chosen, but it will probably be during this or next month. The route has not yet been fixed but the race will probably be run here. The running team organized by Mr. Guyer is meeting regularly to train. Last night five of the members took a two-mile run.

### In the Police Court.

Ell Nelson, the member of the soldiers' home, who was arrested for creating a disturbance at the soldiers' home, may be placed under \$500 bonds to keep the peace by Justice Millard. Nelson is still in jail and there is little likelihood, according to the justice, that he will be able to furnish the bond. The justice has not yet determined just what he will do with Nelson. Thomas Bermus, a Greek, was

arrested by Deputy Marshal Clark for stealing fruit from an Iowa Central car, was released on his own bond by Justice Millard Wednesday night. The evidence of the defense was taken by the justice but the prosecution was not represented at the hearing, and it is likely that the justice will discharge Bermus.

### FIRST HARD FROST.

Temperature Drops to Lowest Point of the Fall, Bringing Frost. A white frost, which was heaviest in the low places, resulted last night from the low temperature and clear weather during the night. The frost was the second and the heaviest of the fall, altho it was not hard enough to kill more than the more tender vegetation. More hardy vegetation was nipped however. No damage was done to the corn, practically all of which is beyond the danger of frost. The temperature during the night dropped to 34, two degrees above zero. The maximum for the day was 58, compared with 74 for the day before. At 7 o'clock this morning the temperature was 58, compared with 53 for the same hour Wednesday morning.

### DATE NOT YET FIXED.

Entertainment Committee of Marshalltown Club Planning Opening. The entertainment committee of the Marshalltown Club, of which James T. Found is chairman, met at the club rooms Wednesday night and discussed informally the plans for the public reception and formal opening to the public of the new club rooms. The date has not yet been fixed, however, and will not be until the manufacturers' and jobbers' exhibits in the club rooms are in place. Several of the booths have been rented, and within a few days some of the displays will be arranged and in place.

Taylor Township Mother, While Cutting Kindling, Narrowly Misses Causing Serious Injury to Child, Who Stepped Under Descending Ax--Child Receives Bad Gash, But is Not Seriously Hurt.
