That 70 is not too old to become a blushing bride will be demonstrated at the soldiers' home assembly hall at the close of prayer meeting this evening, when Mrs. Anna M. Hughes, of Colfax, a soldiers' widow, will become the wife of Ezekiel Grandon, of Benwick, Humboldt county, who is ten years his bride's senior. The wedding is the result of a soldier's home romance, and follows a courtship that began last summer, when the bride was admitted to the home. Mr. Grandon has been a member of the home for several years, and buried his first wife at the home three years ago. Chaplain Jesse Cole will tie the nuptial knot following the mid-week meeting at the home, which begins at 6:30. There is much interest centered in the ceremony among the home members, and tonight's prayer meeting promises to be largely attended.
