BRYAN IS A PUZZLE

IN SPEECH IN DES MOINES HE ENDORSES ONLY TWO DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATES.

MAKES NO REFERENCE TO PLATFORM OR STATE ISSUES

Several Candidates Who Had Seats on Platform Utterly Ignored by Nebraskan—Careful to Make Statement That Might Give Offense to Standpatters—Frankie Confident of Result.

Des Moines, Oct. 15.—What meaning was there to the evident deliberateness with which William J. Bryan avoided any sweeping endorsement of the democratic state ticket any mention of any other than just two of the many democratic candidates for office. This is a question that is bothering some of the leading democrats of this city. Mr. Bryan paid a high compliment to Claude Porter, and said it in such a manner that everyone knew he was sincere and honest in his belief. His thought was, however, that Mr. Porter is a man of such sympathies that he would make a splendid governor, and that he had the moral courage to act in accordance with his own best judgment. He did not say to vote for Porter because of the platform on which he was running nor because of any special thing he would do as Iowa governor.

Right then he turned aside and stated that he did not care to go on with his personal references, because he could only speak from personal knowledge, and he did not know other candidates.

But at Creston he also spoke of Mr. Maxwell, who is running for judge in that district, and he spoke of Dewey and Jones, who are running for railroad commissioner, and he commended all these. And on the platform beside Bryan in Des Moines was Farley Sheldon, of Ames, the candidate of his party for lieutenant governor, and two or three of the candidates for district judge, and the candidate for state senator, the two candidates for representatives, and others. Not a word of comfort for them, even indirectly. He did not at any place in Iowa commend the democratic candidate for attorney general to the voters. Yet here is the hottest fight of all.

He spoke in the Eighth district for Frank Stuart and here he spoke personally for Clint Price. He undoubtedly would have spoken in the Ninth against Smith, but it will always remain unknown whether he would have said a personal word for Cleveland. He was just on the border of the Sixth district and said not a word in favor of Dan Hamilton. It is known that under no circumstances would he have been willing to speak for D. D. Murphy, or for Pepper. He probably would have been glad of a chance to say something for John Dennison.

It was evident, in short, that Mr. Bryan was over-nice in his selection of the candidates he would personally endorse. He had just made it very plain that he recognized the fact that there are standpatters in the democratic party, and some of them run for office.

Another thing about his address in Des Moines that seemed to have been carefully studied out was that in no place did he say a word that could be offensive in any way to a standpatter. He never once alluded to Aldrich or Cannon, hardly mentioned Taft and Tawney, and strictly avoided any reference to Congressman Hull or Murphy. He had been advised that it is the expectation that the democrats will win this district by coaxing a large number of standpat "regulars" to vote the democratic ticket.

But it is nevertheless true that Mr. Bryan had a fine audience and hundreds were turned away.

Frankie is Confident. Having concluded the work of holding a conference in each of the eleven congressional districts in the state, Chairman C. F. Franke, of the republican committee, returned to Des Moines yesterday, satisfied with this part of the campaign work.

The primary system, the greater intelligence of the voters and their independence have revolutionized the way the method of conducting a political campaign. Chairman Franke believes that for getting in direct touch with the voters, the best results can be had by and thru a complete organization.

Until the present time Mr. Franke has declined to make any public statement, notwithstanding the publication of some articles to the contrary. He held that no intelligent opinion could be formed without a personal interview with the leaders in the respective districts and counties. At the district meetings which he called and which were largely attended in each instance the situations were gone over with the county chairman, legislative candidates, congressional committeemen and congressional nominees. It was upon the knowledge gained at these meetings that Mr. Franke bases the authorized statement he made today. It follows: "Two years ago the committee received the best kind of results from the congressional district conferences. The conferences for this year having all been held, I am pleased to say that in not one instance was there

evidence among those present of any disposition to do anything except support the whole ticket. Party patriotism and party pride predominated and the determination to win was the spirit manifested. Every chairman is a live wire and with a continuation of the present activity of all the committeemen and candidates, there will be a large vote polled, and I feel confident that the result on Nov. 8 will be gratifying to the republicans of Iowa.

From now on Mr. Franke will spend his entire time at the state committee's headquarters in Des Moines. Governor Carroll's itinerary for next week has been given out. It follows: Monday, Oct. 17, the governor will make a tour of Wright county, his principal address being at Eagle Grove. Tuesday he will tour Kosciusko county and his evening address will be at Stout. Wednesday he will spend in Sioux City. A big night meeting has been arranged for him there. It was in Sioux City that the democratic nominee for governor, Claude R. Porter, opened his speaking campaign several weeks ago. Mr. Carroll will go from Sioux City to Carroll. Thursday will be spent in a trip over Carroll county. Friday he will make addresses in Jefferson and Boone. Saturday he will be at Winterset.

WOMAN DROWNS IN TANK Mrs. Sophia Schnorr, Widow, Near Hawkeye, Supposed to Have Gone to Stock Tank at Night to Procure Water and Fallen in Accidentally. Special to Times-Republican.

Hawkeye, Oct. 15.—Mrs. Sophia Schnorr, a widow residing three miles west of here, was found dead in the stock watering tank at her home. Her death is supposed to have been the result of an accident, the supposition being that as there was no water in the house she went to the well in the night after some, falling into the tank and drowning. Mrs. Schnorr, who was 62 years old, lived with her sons, Henry C. and Fred, her husband having died a year or two ago. She was subject to dizzy spells.

When her son started to do the chores in the morning he discovered his mother's dead body in the tank. The coroner's jury returned a verdict of accidental drowning. There is nothing to bear out the theory of suicide except the fact that Mrs. Schnorr had been in ill health for years. She had not shown any signs of intending self-destruction and as the family are wealthy and happy she had no motive for ending her life. She was a member of the Lutheran church.

Northern Iowa Items

Waverly. Robert Bennett has sold his farm of sixty acres, known as the Dermody place, south of the city limits, to August Selesky, for \$185 per acre.

Dubuque. Despite the protest of various Catholic societies to the mayor, "The Girl in the Taxi" was presented here Wednesday night. Mayor Haas refused to take any action upon the complaint.

Tipton. B. J. Matern recently threshed his clover seed, which yielded better than he expected. He has a four acre patch that yielded 22 1/2 bushels, which is worth \$10 per bushel—which makes \$55 per acre.

Reinbeck. Pete Wolthoff's sale amounted to nearly \$10,000 and was one of the biggest sales ever held in this locality. The goods brought as high as \$235, hogs better than \$17, corn \$18.75 per acre. Mr. Wolthoff has farmed for himself about eight years and has over \$16,000 to show for his work. He will move to his own farm in Howard county.

Greene. The 4-year-old son of Frank Bowman, three miles north of Greene, met with a serious accident recently by being kicked by a horse while playing about the stable. The bones of his forehead were crushed and a large gash cut in his face, but by the skillful treatment of the physicians who were called he is slowly recovering.

Dows. A brakeman on the Germania and Dows way freight was struck on the forehead by a rock, hurled by one of Rowan's juvenile mischiefs, while the train was switching at that place Wednesday night. He was rendered unconscious for a time and taken to the city and was given medical attention and was able to go out on his run next morning.

Dows. Adolph Buttenhoff shot what many people about town took to be a young eagle. The bird was circling over the grove at the Buttenhoff home, east of town, and, as he took it for a chicken hawk, he grabbed a gun and succeeded in bringing the bird down with the first shot. The bird measured over six feet from tip to tip.

Fort Dodge. Wednesday was a record breaker in the issuance of marriage licenses at the office of County Clerk A. Brynson, six being issued in the afternoon alone, in addition to several during the morning hours. The record has not been equaled on any day since the first of the present year.

Ida Grove. While out auto riding with her husband one evening recently Mrs. W. J. Anderson was struck on the head by a stone thrown by some one of a party of youths gathered at a school house. While not seriously injured, Mrs. Anderson was painfully hurt and was unconscious for a time. Mr. Anderson was unable to locate the hurler of the stone—which was fortunate for the thrower of missiles.

Danbury. In a runaway of a carriage containing the children of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Frank, of Danbury, little Susanne was thrown out and landed directly on a bee hive. Besides being badly stung her face was cut so that seven stitches had to be taken to close the wounds. Mr. Frank had just alighted from the carriage and helped his wife out when the horses became frightened and ran away.

RENTER MAKES A FARM

TAMA COUNTY MAN PROVES TENANT CAN MAKE MONEY.

HOLDS RECORD-BREAKING SALE. WILL OCCUPY OWN LAND

Two Thousand People Attend Public Sale Held by Otto Thomas — Proceeds Amount to \$200 More Than Thomas Expected—Livestock Brings High Prices—Other News.

Traer, Oct. 15.—That a renter can make money on an Iowa farm with proper management is exemplified in the case of Otto Thomas, who has been living on a rented farm in Tama county. On Wednesday of this week Mr. Thomas held a public auction, the proceeds of which will probably pay for a farm which he has bought in Orange township, in this county—the Wayman place.

For the amount of property sold the proceeds were the largest ever secured in Iowa at a farm sale. Fifteen head of horses brought \$4,650. Yearling steers sold for \$35 to \$45 a head, 2-year-olds for \$55 to \$65 and cows for \$50 to \$75. Hogs also sold high and all other property in proportion.

Enormous Crowd Present. There were probably 2,000 people, all told, at the sale. Dinner was served to 1,250 at noon. This army of people required a large quantity of eatables, but Mr. Thomas and his family were prepared for the throng.

The sale netted Mr. Thomas \$2,000 more than he had expected. He will remove soon to his new farm in Orange, and will be more independent from now on, as he will be on his own land.

This is a striking example of what energetic effort, wisely directed, may accomplish on rented farms in Iowa. It is alike complimentary to the resources of the soil and the fine business talent of the renter.

HOLDER FAMILY SAFE. Former Nevada Residents Escaped From Forest Fires But Lost All. Special to Times-Republican.

Nevada, Oct. 15.—Word has at least been received by relatives in this city that the Holder family, formerly residents of Nevada, who it was feared had perished in the northern Minnesota

forest fires, were safe, but that they had lost all of their property. Addison Holder, wife and two children lived in Spooner. When the danger was first apparent the residents of the town abandoned all and rushed to the railway, where a switch engine was hitched to a string of empty box cars, the people hustled into the improvised train and they were hauled to safety. So far as they have been able to learn about a score of people perished in Spooner.

Holder had a valuable timber claim proved up on. He also owned two residence properties in Spooner. The elder Holders had filed on a claim up in that region but had not left Crookston for the new country and were thus in safety.

DIVIDED IT BY TWELVE. Carroll Jury Reached Novel Verdict in Damage Case. Special to Times-Republican.

Carroll, Oct. 15.—The case of J. W. Hudgins against Fred Rohrbek, in the district court here afforded a little fun for all concerned. Last spring Mr. Hudgins, a rural mail carrier, purchased a house of Rohrbek, which was guaranteed to be sound in every particular. The day after the sale the horse developed a case of heaves. Hudgins therefore sued for damages. The jury returned a verdict for Hudgins, the plaintiff, for \$35.40 and costs. When questioned as to how the jury arrived at the 40 cents, the real estate agent, when one of the jurymen disclosed the fact that the several amounts, according to the individual opinion of each jurymen as to damages, were added and divided by twelve, the number of jurymen, to determine the amount of damage due the plaintiff.

This is a new and novel way of arriving at a verdict, and as to the amount, but the attorney for the defense has made application for a new trial, which will come up at the next term of court.

BOY'S HAND MAIMED. Manchester Lad Picks Dynamite Cap and Explodes Fingert. Special to Times-Republican.

Manchester, Oct. 15.—The 14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. S. W. Rich, who live about four miles north of this city, was the victim of a painful accident when a dynamite cap with which he was playing exploded, causing the young man to lose a thumb and index finger. The accident happened at the country school the young boy attended. It seems that in some way some of the children had gotten some dynamite caps and, thinking they were gun cartridges, were experimenting with them and it was while the Rich lad was picking one to pieces that the accident happened.

The smaller Rich child, who is but 5 months old, who was reported to have been the victim of infantile paralysis a few weeks ago, seems to be slowly recovering.

BAD RUNAWAY AT AMES. Mrs. F. M. Clutier Seriously and Mrs. Steve Loughran Painfully Injured. Special to Times-Republican.

Nevada, Oct. 15.—A serious accident occurred near the viaduct in Ames, when a horse which was being driven by Mrs. Steve Loughran became frightened and overturned the carriage, containing besides Mrs. Loughran, Mrs. F. M. Clutier and two children. All were thrown out and both of the ladies were injured. Mrs. Clutier was knocked unconscious, a couple of ribs were broken and a number of others torn loose. The buggy passed over Mrs. Loughran's head, bruising her up considerably. The children escaped injury. A physician was hastily summoned, and the ladies were taken into a nearby home, where their injuries were cared for.
