Still Hopeful Monday. "At 3 o'clock Monday morning orders were given to start the engines in the hope of reaching the Azores or Europe, which was possible even yet if the winds should hold favorable."

READ AT EVERY OFFICIAL MEETING FOR 75 YEARS

Officers of Church Appeal to Supreme Court of United States to Relieve Them of Burden Imposed by Whimsical Old Minister in Conditional Bequest of \$20,000.

New York, Oct. 19.—The supreme court of the United States will be appealed to by the officers of the Dutch Reformed Church of America to relieve that body from reading the tedious will of Rev. Dr. Van Bunschoten at every official meeting of the church corporation.

For seventy-five years the reading of the will has constituted a routine part of the business of every meeting of the corporate body of the Reformed church in this country.

It seems that the church seventy-five years ago accepted a legacy of \$20,000 from Van Bunschoten, who made his gift conditional, requiring that his will be read at every session of the church officers.

The money has long since been spent, but the duty of reading the irksome testament still hangs over the church.
