BODY BLOWN TO ATOMS

ENGINEER AND FIREMAN ON NORTHWESTERN KILLED BY EXPLOSION.

BOILER BLOWS UP WHILE TRAIN IS TRAVELING FAST

Engineer Kollman Torn to Pieces — Fireman Debates Dies Later and Brakeman Fivola, Perhaps Fatally Hurt—All Residents of Belle Plaine—Cause of Accident Unknown.

Special to Times-Republican. Belle Plaine, Oct. 20.—By the explosion of a locomotive boiler on a coal train at Hartwick, twelve miles south of Belle Plaine, late yesterday, on the south branch, Ed Kollman, engineer, and Frank Debates, fireman, are dead, and Frank Fivola, brakeman, was fatally injured.

Running Thirty Miles Per Hour. It seems when the train left Hartwick going north, nothing unusual about the engine was noticed. An unverified report is that "she was foaming," which means the heated water and oil were being thrown out of the engine.

Engine Total Wreck. The engine now lies thirty feet east of the track and is nothing but a broken boiler. All of the top works were stripped as clean as the shaved off. All of the lower running gear, wheels, trucks, etc., are almost on the rails under a wreckage of seven coal cars.

It appears as tho the whole train of loaded coal cars stopped instantly, and remarkable as it is, seven cars and the caboose in the rear of the train stayed on the rails and were hauled back to Hartwick uninjured.


