ALDRICH MAY STICK

PROBABLY WILL BE A CANDIDATE FOR RE-ELECTION FROM RHODE ISLAND.

STATE LEADERS CAN'T AGREE UPON A SUCCESSOR

Deadlock Probable in Legislature and Aldrich Will Be Sprung as Man to Break It—Summoned From European Trip Because of Mixed Political Situation.

[Special Correspondence]

Washington, Oct. 20.—When Senator Aldrich of Rhode Island, announced several months ago that he would retire from the senate at the expiration of his present term, March 4, 1917, there was a widespread suspicion in Washington that circumstances would shape themselves that he would announce that he had reconsidered and would be a candidate for re-election. These circumstances are beginning to take shape. Information reaching Washington from Rhode Island is to the effect that the republican leaders in that state are unable to agree on a candidate to succeed Aldrich. The two principal candidates for the senatorial seat are Henry P. Lippitt, the man who practically dictated the cotton sewing machine law, and Colonel Stanton Pomeroy, Col. head of the rubber trust, with which Senator Aldrich is affiliated. Neither man is willing to give way and, it is reported, there is imminent danger that the legislature will be deadlocked when it meets next January. The deadlock, it now appears, will provide the excuse for the return of Aldrich for another six year term.

Senator Aldrich was spending a pleasant vacation in Europe, leaving the republican politics of the state to the hands of "Blind Boss" Brayton. The civil war veteran who has engineered many political deals thru the state legislature, died suddenly and chaos immediately followed. As a result Senator Aldrich was compelled to cut his vacation short and he is now back at his home personally taking up the strings of the machine which were dropped by Brayton.

It is not believed that the Democrats have even a remote chance to control the next legislature. It is almost certain, therefore, that either Senator Aldrich or one of his friends will be elected to the senate. The two candidates most prominent in the race are quite as much identified with the business interests as is Senator Aldrich himself. Both men are spending money liberally in an effort to control votes at the next legislature and present indications that the vote will be about even. Should this prediction come true, it is felt here that Senator Aldrich will permit himself to be prevailed upon by his friends to announce that his duty to his party makes it necessary for him to again be a candidate.

OLDFIELD INDEFINITELY OUT. Daring Race Violated Rules, Says Auto Association Contest Board.

New York, Oct. 20.—The contest board of the American Automobile Association issued a statement last night indefinitely suspending Barney Oldfield and his managers, Messrs. Pickens and Sloan, because Oldfield "committed a flagrant violation of the rules at a sanctioned meeting at Readville, Mass., on Oct. 14, by intruding himself upon the track in his Benz racing car and without official start or timing, made several circuits of the track in defiance of the warnings of officials." It is further ordered that Oldfield's machine be disqualified from any sanctioned contest.

This action by the board is sort of a double disqualification in that Oldfield had previously been suspended for his announced intention of racing with Jack Johnson. This race will be held at Sheepshead Bay today. Oldfield's manager, Pickens, in a statement says it is a war to the finish between Oldfield and the association.

DIETZ FAMILY REFUSED BAIL. Judge Declines to Act, Saying He Has Not Jurisdiction.

Eau Claire, Wis., Oct. 20.—Bail was refused John F. Dietz, Mrs. Dietz and their son Leslie, by Judge Wickham. They are accused of the shooting of Madison and Deputy Ackley, from Hayward late yesterday, and were taken directly to the court house.

Attorney Rubin asked for bail for the prisoners, but the judge declined to act, as no record of preliminary proceedings was presented, and he had not acquired jurisdiction.

Date for a further hearing was set for next Wednesday at Hayward. The prisoners will remain overnight, going back to Hayward today.

The Sun as Lighthouse Keeper. "The adoption by the government of acetone gas, acetylene dissolved in acetone, for use of lighthouses, beacons, lightships and light buoys, will soon revolutionize the whole system of coast lighting in this country, and the lighthouse keeper and buoy tender will be forced to find new vocations," declared William Thavis, in the November number of Popular Mechanics. He explains further: "Acetylene, in its various forms, is the only commodity yet produced that will give a light next in power to that of the sun. By its use, inventors have been permitted to produce lights for a continuous period of from one to five years or more, according to the amount of fuel installed. "The most wonderful light in the world and now in use by the United

States government, is the one invented by Delan, the Swedish scientist. It is produced by acetone gas, and has a "human working" sun instrument containing a glass tube of several rods of varying reflective powers which automatically opens and closes the valve in accordance with the light absorbed. In other words, the light burns continuously until affected by the heat of the sun, when it goes out, only to be revived at dawn. It also contains a flashing apparatus in the lantern.
