TO CONSERVE BIG SUPPLY FOR BOONE RIVER POWER

Also Will Add to Beauty of Hamilton-Wright County Lake as Summer Resort—Commission Plans to Aid Power Companies Along Boone River in Dry Seasons—Other Iowa News.
