MRS. W. M. MACK SWALLOWS SEVERAL TABLETS, BUT DENIES ATTEMPTED SUICIDE.

SAYS SHE HAD POINT TO GAIN IN TAKING TABLETS

Physician Hurries to Mack Home and Administers Antidotes For Poison — Woman Sends Word to Neighbor Above, Telling Her Good Bye, and Neighbor Calls Doctor.

Denying today most emphatically that she had attempted her life, and declaring that she had taken "something" to gain a desired point, yet refusing to say what she was trying to accomplish, Mrs. Mabel Mack, aged about 28, wife of W. M. Mack, 408 East Linn street, swallowed what the attending physician believes to be a quantity of one-eighth grain morphine sulphate pills shortly after 7 o'clock Friday night, and as a result had apparently a close call from death.

The prompt action of Mrs. Charles Reiser, who lives upstairs in the same house as a physician, probably saved the woman's life, although Mrs. Mack today claims that at no time was she unconscious of her surroundings and in danger. She claims that she did not take morphine, but refuses to say what she took.

Dr. Tidd administered to the woman a hypodermic injection of apo-morphia, the strongest emetic known to counteract the effects of morphine, and good results were obtained, although today Mrs. Mack declares that she did not rid her stomach of anything that she had taken.
