MRS. McMAHON FREED FORMER IOWA WOMAN ACQUITTED OF MURDERING HUSBAND'S LAW PARTNER.

JURY CONSIDERED SHOOTING BY WOMAN WAS JUSTIFIED Defense Shows Judge Thomas, the Victim, Aggravated Mrs. McMahon, Made Improper Proposals to Her and Asked Her to Elope With Him—Civil Suit Brought by Widow Still Pending

Sturgis, S. D., Nov. 24.—Mrs. Nellie McMahon, formerly of Iowa, who on the morning of July 30 shot and killed David P. Thomas, an attorney in his office here, was acquitted by a jury and is now a free woman. The jury deliberated about four hours before agreeing upon the verdict, which is surprising to those who have followed the evidence closely.

Two eye witnesses testified to the deliberate character of the shooting when Mrs. McMahon came into the place where Thomas was talking with William Curper and said: "I want you to vacate this office." As Thomas turned toward the woman smiling, but not speaking, she deliberately shot him and he fell, dying almost instantly. W. H. Anderson, who was in the office at the time, testified to witnessing practically the same incident.

Mrs. McMahon, who was expected to base her defense upon the plea of temporary insanity, brought on by trouble with Thomas after the death of the woman's husband, who was his law partner, made a strong point of Thomas' aggression upon her private rights, and told a story of his having repeatedly come to her home at unreasonable hours, seeking admittance, also proposing that she dispose of her holdings in and around Sturgis, and then go away with him.

Thomas, whose parents live at O'Neill, Neb., was a graduate of Iowa university and was one of the prominent attorneys in the western part of the state. He had recently been nominated for county judge and considered a clean man. Business differences between the woman and her husband's former partner were known to exist between the time of McMahon's death and the killing of Thomas.

There is still a civil suit pending. Thomas brought the suit of damages against Mrs. McMahon, for \$10,000. The family of the murdered man was left practically without support as the husband and father had not yet become thoroughly established in business here. Mrs. McMahon is wealthy, as her husband had large land holdings in addition to his real estate business here in which Thomas participated.

DEEMER STILL CONSIDERED. Iowa Man May Be Selected by Taft For Supreme Bench.

Special to Times-Republican. Washington, Nov. 24.—Following the retirement of Justice Moody from the United States supreme court, which became official a fact yesterday, speculation is renewed as to the probable successor of the Massachusetts jurist.


It is quite certain that the president will announce his appointment very soon after his return from Panama. This he will do in order that the senate may approve or disapprove of his choice immediately upon the resumption of congress in December.

There are many possibilities now being discussed in connection with the chief justiceship as well as the associate justiceship made vacant by the resignation of Justice Moody. Judge Horace E. Deemer of the Iowa supreme court is being talked of for one of the places. Judge Skaggs of New Jersey, also, while Judge Vandevanter and other United States judges of the eighth circuit are being considered by the president.

The death of Solicitor General Lloyd W. Bowers and that of counselor Henry M. Holt of the state department, remove two of the most likely possibilities in the field. It is moderately certain that the president would have promoted one and possibly both.

PRIZES FOR FARMERS IOWA CORN SHOW MANAGERS SEEK TO INTEREST FARM HANDS.

EXHIBITS OF GRAIN CARRIED FREE BY THE RAILROADS Entire Space in Coliseum Will Be Required to Display Farm Products—All Exhibits Must Be in Place By Dec. 5—Valuable Premiums Offered—Other News.

Des Moines, Nov. 24.—Farm hands are not to be neglected in the contests arranged for the corn exposition which is to be held in the Coliseum in Des Moines on Dec. 5 to 17. One special class of exhibits known as class M, is open only to the farm hands of the state. Those eligible to entry in this class must have been in the employ of the farmer from whose field the sample of corn is selected from the time it was planted until the time it was harvested.

Some valuable premiums are offered for those winning premiums in this class. The railroads of the state have taken an active interest in the coming contest. As a special inducement they have offered to carry all exhibits of grain to and from Des Moines without charge. The exhibition is not confined to the display of corn. Preparations have been made for displays of all other classes of grains.

WATERLOO STORE ROBBED. Thieves Secure \$300 in Cash From Open Safe.

Waterloo, Nov. 24.—The Golden Rule store, managed by the Ferguson brothers, was entered by thieves sometime between midnight and morning and about \$300 stolen. At the latter hour, a patrolman while going thru the alley in the rear of the store discovered the rear door standing open. The proprietors were notified and on investigation found that the small safe in the rear of the store had been rifled of nearly \$300 in currency.

The safe was not locked and had not been for many months, it not being the usual thing to keep such an amount of money in the store. The thief or thieves were evidently aware of this fact, as after forcing an entrance from the alley all they had to do was to swing the safe door open and make off with the bills and silver. Besides relieving the safe of its contents the robbers did not molest a thing in the store.

IOWA BOY MAKES GOOD. Former Greene County Man Elected Senator in Washington.

Special to Times-Republican. Saratoga, Nov. 24.—Mr. E. J. Allen was born and reared in Saratoga, Iowa, and graduated in law at Iowa City in the year of 1904. He then went to North Yakima, Wash., and in the month of May, 1905, while engaged in the practice of law, was elected city attorney and was re-elected each term until the fall of 1910, and then he was elected state senator on the republican ticket by a large majority. Mr. Allen's parents both live here and are very highly respected and the good reports from their son are very gratifying to them.

TABLE SALT IN THE SUGAR. Responsible for Illness of Middles et Annals.

Washington, Nov. 24.—Ordinary table salt in the sugar which they used was responsible for the illness of middlemen at the naval academy at Annapolis. They were supposed to have been the victims of a general plot executed in the ordinary department of the school. Officials of the navy department are inclined to the belief that the salt found its way into the sugar thru accident and that there was no plot.

HUTTER NOT GUILTY. Jury Acquits Dubuque Man of Charge

Dubuque, Nov. 24.—After a trial lasting more than a week the jury, late this afternoon, returned a verdict of not guilty in the case of Henry Hutter, charged with the murder of Charles V. Vietzen. The jury was out four hours. Vietzen, an aged man, on May 2 got into an altercation with Hutter, both being employed as teamsters at the Standard Lumber Company. Hutter struck Vietzen, who, altho he returned to work for several days thereafter, died twenty-four days later. The case was based on the question whether the blow superinduced death or whether it was apoplexy.

North Central Poultry Show. Special to Times-Republican.

Forest City, Nov. 24.—The North Central Iowa Poultry Association will hold its show in this city on Dec. 5-6-7-8. W. B. Russell, of Ottumwa, has been secured as a judge. An effort will be made to make this a permanent show.
