## Disowning Some Legal Advice

Editor Times-Republican: In your issue of this day, under a Des Moines date line you say: "Both Mayor Ingledue's direct evidence and his cross examination endeavored to establish that he had been advised by three lawyers, Boardman, Northrup and Huber that federal officers were not immune from arrest under circumstances such as those surrounding the Van Wert case."

This statement is untrue. My editor was present when Mayor Ingledue testified and without doubt wrote the dispatch. You have at former times stated that I so advised the mayor and added suggestions intended to be detrimental to the writer. I have remained silent because my personal affairs should be subordinated to my clients' interests. The fact is, not only did the mayor not so testify—but he stated just the contrary viz.: that he did not ask my opinion on this matter. I never advised the mayor that these officers were immune from arrest or that he had a right to try them. No one outside of your paper has ever said that I did and your own editor while on the witness stand made no such claim—and he was there. The federal court was the last say. The federal court, Boardman, with the question, "Do I have to do this?" release them under bond, and his "personal counsel" replied substantially, "I am not in the case, but you can do as you damn please."


The testimony at Des Moines did show that the two county attorneys had tried to keep the federal officers from going to jail, while the mayor had sent for City Attorney Northrup and for his "personal counsel," Boardman, and the federal court, in its opinion, did say that the bonds should have been accepted, that the men should not have been confined and that the mayor had been oppressive. It is true that Mr. Boardman's theory of the defense was that Ingledue had been advised by the county attorneys, and by Northrup and Ingledue testified as desired, but it is hardly fair for the two lawyers called in by the mayor to battle with the two county attorneys to try to get out from under Judge McPherson's strictures and let the roof fall on others. To say that it is amusing to see Northrup jump into an effort to let it fall on the mayor's "personal counsel," whose client, Ingledue, had testified so as to let it fall on Northrup, while the "personal counsel" in turn side steps toward the conviction of the mayor with his effort to let it fall on Egermayer—Ed.
