TRYING TO HOLE PARTY

EFFORT BEING MADE TO EMBAR-RASS LEGISLATURE IN HOPE-LESS TANGLE.

HOPE TO TIE UP CHOICE FOR DOLLIVER SUCCESSION

One Effort Aims to Organize a Bolt of Legislative Caucus - Deliberate Faisnooda Being Told Concerning Senator Cummins in Order to Create Discord Among Progressives.

Des Moines, Nov. 28.—A campaign to put the republican party in a hopeless muddle and to tangle up the legislature so badly that it will never get out is apparently well under way.

Among other inaccuracies in the statement is that Senator Cummins did not attend the conference. He did nothing of the sort. He held no conference. Governor Garst was not at Cummins' office nor was he seen by him.

STOCK JUDGING TEAM AT CHICAGO SHOW BEATEN BY TWO COLLEGES.

ONE AMES STUDENT AMONG RANKING TEN

Judging Team Falls Below Missouri and Nebraska on Annual Contest—Fail in Cattle Department—Forty-Five Students in All Entered—The Results.

Chicago, Nov. 28.—Double honors fell to the University of Missouri yesterday when the twelve judges of the agricultural students' contest, held annually in connection with Chicago's International Live Stock exposition, made known their official figures.

Forty-five students in all, making nine teams from as many colleges, competed, which emphasizes the completeness of Missouri's sweeping victory.



When getting a quick meal the bed of hot coals can be raised up to the top of the stove just like a gas flame can be turned up and one does not have to wait for new fuel to burn or a quick fire can be built with a small amount of fuel and then raised to the top of the stove for cooking a quick meal without filling up the fire box and waiting for a large body of fuel to burn.

Then when baking it is to be done the grate can be lowered until the fire box has the full depth of the average fire box in first class ranges. All it requires is a few turns with the shaker handle.
