SIMON SELLS STORE
Well-Known Merchant to Retire From
Retail Line, and Disposes of Stock
to R. C. Dolbin, Prominent Chicago
Department Store Manager—Change
Effective Jan. 15.
 An important change in local retail
 circles will go into effect Jan. 15 when
 the A. H. Simon store, ladies' cloaks,
 suits, and furnishings, 32 East Main
 street, will be turned over to R. C.
 Dolbin, of Chicago, a young man
 prominent in Chicago department
 store circles, and a department man-
 ager for The Fair.
 The sale of the business was con-
 summated Thursday, but Mr. Simon
 does not give possession until the
 15th of next month. Mr. Simon has
 been negotiating his sale for some
 time, and has had several offers to
 sell. He selected Mr. Dolbin, however,
 because of his experience in a similar
 line of business, and because Mr. Si-
 mon feels that the business that he
 has built from the foundation will not
 only be kept up to its present standard,
 but improved.
 Mr. Dolbin has had many years' ex-
 perience in retail merchandise circles,
 and has had charge of the entire as-
 sement of The Fair, including the buying
 and advertising. His wife, who was
 formerly head trimmer in Gage
 Bros.' wholesale millinery establish-
 ment in Chicago, will enter the busi-
 ness with him.
 Mr. Simon established his store here
 five years ago, and has been very suc-
 cessful. He started in a small way,
 and has built up a fine business that,
 now that he has sold, makes him feel
 that he doesn't know whether he really
 wants to leave the retail field or not.
 Mr. Simon has had an eye on a manu-
 facturing venture for some time, and
 it is his line that he expects to take up.
 His plans for the future, however, are
 not sufficiently definite to make public.
 Mr. and Mrs. Dolbin will come to the
 city on Jan. 10 to get ready to take
 over the store.

Moines—Smallpox Appears in School
and Books Are Destroyed—Auditor
Bleakley's Daughter a Fever Victim.

 Bleakley's oldest daughter was found
 today to be ill with typhoid, and many
 other bad cases were reported to the
 health authorities. Smallpox was also
 discovered prevalent in the Casady
 school in the northwestern part of the

 fumigation had of the premises. Chil-
 dren were in school yesterday, who
 last night came down with the small-
 pox.
NINETEEN PER CENT GO WRONG.
**State Parole Board Issues Report Cov-
 ering Three Years.**

 the board of parole today for three
 years, being the first report of that
 board, shows that in all ninety con-
 victs under determinate sentences
 have been paroled and 131 who had re-
 ceived indeterminate sentences. Of the

 and 262 continued. Of all those paroled
 19 per cent have gone wrong after-
 wards. On June 30 last there were 123
 reporting and fifty-one had received
 final discharge.
