A. C. SNYDER DEAD.

Old Traveling Man Succumbs to Diabetic Gangrene.

Aaron C. Snyder, an old Iowa traveling man, and for the past two years in the real estate business in this city, died at 2:45 this afternoon at his home, 504 West Linn street, of diabetic gangrene. Mr. Snyder had been a victim of the diabetic trouble for about ten years, and the gangrene developed about two months ago, involving the right foot and lower half of the leg. In that time Mr. Snyder had fallen rapidly, and the end was not unexpected.

Mr. Snyder was about 65 years old, and moved to this city from Chicago. He was an old resident of Dubuque where he lived for several years, and out of which city he traveled.

Mr. Snyder was a member of the Masonic fraternity, a member of a Chicago blue lodge, and of the commandery at Dubuque. He was a member of El Kahir temple, of the Mystic Shrine, at Cedar Rapids.

Aside from his wife Mr. Snyder is survived by three children, two daughters and one son. The son, whose home is in Chicago, is here, as is also a daughter who lives at Dubuque. The other daughter lives here.

It is likely that the body will be sent to Dubuque for interment.

MRS. HOLLINGSWORTH DEAD.

Wife of Former Marshalltown Carpenter Dies in Freewater, Ore.

Mr. J. C. Hollingsworth, of this city, this morning received the news of the death of his brother's wife, Mrs. I. M. Hollingsworth, which took place at Freewater, Ore., on Nov. 30. Mr. Hollingsworth was a former carpenter of this city, having resided here for a number of years. Mrs. Hollingsworth's death was due to heart disease. She was 53 years of age. Mr. and Mrs. Hollingsworth moved from this city to Oregon about fifteen years ago. They have been living in Freewater for four years. Mr. Hollingsworth's mother, Mrs. Nancy Hollingsworth, another brother, William Hollingsworth, and a sister, Mrs. E. Fahey, live in this city.
