### PITIFUL APPEALS FOR LOST KINSMEN

#### AGED WOMAN IN BALTIMORE WANTS TO KNOW WHEREABOUTS OF PEOPLE.

#### WHITTIER, CAL., GIRL IS IN SAME PLIGHT

#### Both Think Relatives Are Here or Near Here and Are Anxious to Hear From Them—Baltimore Woman Does Not Expect to Live Long, and Longs for News of Cousins.

In an effort to find some traces of long-lost relatives two persons, at far-away points, have written Postmaster C. H. Smith, asking his help. The postmaster has exhausted all sources at his command, and has referred the letters to the Times-Republican, in the hopes that the relatives sought, or at least some of their friends who may know of their whereabouts, will be attracted to the appeals.

#### Has Only Short Time to Live.

Carrie Belle Owings, No. 16 North Fremont avenue, Baltimore, Md., wants to find cousins whom she believed moved to this country twenty-five years ago. The family name, as nearly as can be deciphered, is Wedons. The family came west from near Queenstown, Md. There were in the party father, mother, one son, and four daughters. The father afterwards died. Mrs. Owings' mother, whose name was Annie Hampton, was a sister of Wedons, and died nine years ago. One of Wedons' daughters, Fannie, corresponded with her Baltimore cousin for some time, but Mrs. Owings finally lost track of her. As she is becoming old, and is a cripple, Mrs. Owings says she does not expect to live much longer, and is anxious to hear of her relatives before she dies.

#### Girl's Pitiful Appeal.

From Whittier, Cal., comes a pitiful appeal from a girl, Isabel Brown, who is seeking her father and brother—Fred A. and Willie Brown. Isabel Brown, who wants to learn the whereabouts of her father and brother, says that they were in Marshalltown two years ago. On the day her letter was written Miss Brown says that she had just learned that as a child she was taken from her father, and that he does not know where she is. The girl says that from all she can learn her brother had gone back to her father in Marshalltown two years ago, and she thinks they are together now, either here, or at some other Iowa point. #### Relinquished Church Work.

It is pointed out that with the exception of a few routine matters the actual direction of the church work was relinquished to a great degree by Mrs. Eddy some years previous to her death, although she continued to keep in close touch with those to whom she had entrusted the work and had a clear understanding of how it was being performed.

#### FIGHT OVER ESTATE LIKELY.

Glover, Mrs. Eddy's Son, Now En Route to Boston.

Deadwood, S. D., Dec. 5.—With his daughter Mary and son George W. Glover, Jr., George Washington Glover, son of Mrs. Mary Baker Glover Eddy, the noted head of the Christian Science faith, left on last evening's Northwestern train for Boston to attend his mother's funeral, which he believes will be held at Titon, N. H.

Miss Mary Glover was so affected by the news that she fainted three times yesterday, owing to heart trouble, and may not be able to complete the trip.

Glover is expected to put up a legal fight for a share in his mother's estate. To all interviewers he refused to discuss this, saying that time would tell, but despite the fact that he is reported to have received a quarter of a million dollar in trust two years ago in return for agreeing not to contest the estate, his attorney, United States Senator William E. Chandler, of Boston, whom he is to visit now, recently intimated in letters received here that the alleged settlement was not valid, questioning Glover's right to settle for his children.

#### Church Will Receive Estate.

Washington, Dec. 5.—Former Senator William E. Chandler of New Hampshire, who was counsel for the children of Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy in the litigation over her estate, said that he believed her fortune—nearly \$2,000,000—had been given to the cause of Christian Science.

"Mrs. Eddy was certainly a remarkable character," said Mr. Chandler. "Her intense correctness, her capacity for influencing her devotees and for organizing churches, make her one of the notable women of the time."

"Her difficulties with her son, George W. Glover, and his family, and with her adopted son, Dr. E. J. Foster (Eddy), were, under my direction as counsel for her, adjusted in a family settlement in 1909, and doubtless all her large estate of nearly \$2,000,000 has been given to promote Christian Science."

### INSANE GET \$250,000 THEATER.

Government Builds Playhouse to Amuse Washington Asylum Inmates. Washington, Dec. 5.—Uncle Sam has gone into the theatrical business. At a cost of \$250,000 he has constructed a playhouse at the government hospital for the insane and will run a continuous performance. There are 4,000 patients in the institution.

Specialists claim that amusement is one of their greatest aids in curing insanity. The government theater at the local asylum is the first ever constructed in the treatment of insane so far as known.

The theater has a seating capacity of 1,200, with a large stage, specially designed scenery, commodious dressing-rooms and full electrical equipment. That the auditorium may be used for dances, the orchestra floor is level instead of pitched, as in theaters generally.

Dr. E. A. Glasscock, the resident physician, acting as theatrical director, has organized a company from among the nurses and attendants and will use home talent in most of the plays produced. A string orchestra and a glee club have been organized at the asylum and a moving picture machine has been put in. It is the intention of the management to keep the doors of the playhouse open all day.
