

MRS. C. H. MORRIS
RESIGNS DEANSHIP

MARSHALLTOWN WOMAN TO RETURN HOME, GIVING UP WORK AT DRAKE.

HUSBAND'S PLANS TO REMAIN HERE CAUSE

When Mrs. Morris Went to Des Moines Mr. Morris Expected in Time to Take Up Field Work For Drake University—Is to Remain Here, and Wife Prefers to Be at Home.

Mrs. Ethel MacDougall Morris, wife of Rev. C. H. Morris, pastor of Central Church of Christ, has tendered her resignation as dean of women of Drake University, Des Moines, to become effective Feb. 1. Mrs. Morris makes the change in order to be at home, and because Mr. Morris has decided to remain in charge of the church here. The announcement of Mrs. Morris' resignation was made public Friday by President Hill M. Bell, of the university.

When Mrs. Morris went to Des Moines, a year ago last September, it was with the idea that eventually her husband would give up his charge here and become associated with the university in his work. This Mr. Morris has decided not to do, because of the pressure that has been brought to bear upon him by his church. It was also understood among the church members that, providing the pastor would remain, the church would work together in the building of the handsome new house of worship here.

Has Been Successful in Her Work at the University, and Has Been Very Popular among the Young Women of the School. Mrs. Morris is fitted with a special fitness for her work among the college women, and it will be with much regret among the students that the school will lose her services. On the other hand the members of the church here, and other personal friends throughout the city, will be glad to know that Mrs. Morris is to return here.

Arkansas Woman Successor.

Miss Elizabeth Walker Jordan, of Fayetteville, Ark., has been chosen as Mrs. Morris' successor, for five years past dean of women and instructor in English in the University of Arkansas.

MRS. O'NEIL DEAD.

Former Marshalltown Woman Passes Away at Omaha.

The serious illness of Mrs. J. K. O'Neil, of Omaha, formerly Sadie Ward, of this city, which was mentioned in these columns Thursday, resulted in the death of Mrs. O'Neil at Omaha before the brother, W. W. Ward, of this city, reached his sister's bedside. Mrs. O'Neil had been seriously ill for some time, and a surgical operation was performed in the hope of overcoming the trouble. Mrs. O'Neil died a few days following the operation. The funeral was held from the Sacred Heart church at Omaha Friday morning. The body was placed in a receiving vault, and will probably be brought to this city later and interred in Riverside, where Mrs. O'Neil has a sister buried, and where Mr. O'Neil's parents both lie.

Thursday, Dec. 8.

The board met at 10 a. m., all members present; the auditor was authorized to draw warrants in payment of the bills allowed; further action on the Puller road was postponed till the January session.

Rosa Liebig was re-appointed overseer of the poor of Marshalltown for the year 1911 at a salary of fifty dollars per month; and F. L. Meeks was re-appointed superintendent of bridges at the salary of one thousand dollars per year; on motion, all money in the health and insane funds was ordered transferred to the poor fund.

Chairman Emes appointed Keon and Emes as a committee to check the offices of the county superintendent of schools, the auditor and recorder; and Bughly and T. P. Marsh to check the offices of the treasurer, clerk of the courts and the sheriff. On motion the 1909 taxes were remitted for Mrs. M. Kunkle, Fred D. Bailey, St. Lewis Johnson and Frank B. Sheffield in Marshalltown; D. W. Beabout in LeGrand; and Oscar LeFever and J. W. Modlin in Albion; and on motion, one-half of the 1909 taxes paid by George Schott, in Albion, was ordered returned to him. On motion the board adjourned.

Mrs. Coffeen's Father Dead.



John Mahoney and Robert Burton, who were arrested by Constable Morse for being drunk, were let go by Justice Millard this morning.




