**PIONEER OF COUNTY DIES IN VIRGINIA**

**JOHN LUTES, WHO HAD LIVED IN COUNTY FIFTY-FOUR YEARS, CALLED TO REWARD.**

**WAS ON VISIT TO DAUGHTER AT NORFOLK WHEN END CAME.**

Body Will Be Brought Here For Burial, and is Expected Monday Morning—Lutes a Pioneer of Greencastle Township—Owned 400 Acres at Time of Death.

A telegram received this morning from J. A. Pegg, 211 South Second street, told of the death at Norfolk, Va., at 4 o'clock this morning, of John Lutes, father of Mrs. Pegg, Mrs. James Robb, and Mrs. Eugene Glidden, of this city. Mr. Lutes' death removes one of the oldest pioneers of the county. Mr. Lutes having settled in Greencastle township fifty-four years ago. Mr. Lutes died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. A. M. Hanson, whom he went to visit four weeks ago, with the expectation of spending the winter. The cause of Mr. Lutes' death is not known to the children here further than the first word of the illness was to the effect that Mr. Lutes was suffering from a severe attack of indigestion.

**Came to County in 1856.**  
 Mr. Lutes came to Marshall county from Ohio in the spring of 1856, and settled near what was then known as Greencastle postoffice, near where the river was very little to the settlement, although a postoffice was maintained in the log cabin of Jackson Smith, who was the postmaster. A year before Catherine Elery, who was born in Illinois, had settled in the same neighborhood, and Mr. Lutes took her as his wife on July 19, 1859, the wedding being one of the early ones in that part of the county. Mr. and Mrs. Lutes were married at the home of Simon Crosby, of Timber Creek township, by C. A. Haskin, then a justice of the peace, and still a resident of Persimmon now lies. An interesting incident of the celebration of the golden wedding of Mr. and Mrs. Lutes in this city on July 19, 1909, Mr. Haskin, who had performed their wedding ceremony, was present at the anniversary gathering.

After their marriage Mr. and Mrs. Lutes went to farming, and were very successful. At the time of his death Mr. Lutes owned 400 acres of fine farm land near Ferguson. In 1909 Mr. and Mrs. Lutes moved to this city, and made their home at 815 West Boone street.

**Was Native of Ohio.**  
 Mr. Lutes was a native of Ashland county, Ohio, where he was born Feb. 16, 1830. He and Mrs. Lutes became the parents of thirteen children, four of whom are dead. Two of the children died in infancy, and two in childhood. The children who survive, with the mother, are Allen, of Ferguson; Mrs. H. J. Whitehead, of Bangor; Mrs. V. A. Keese and John Lutes, of Marshalltown; Mrs. James Robb, of Marshalltown; Fred Lutes, of Ferguson; Mrs. A. M. Hanson, of Norfolk, Va.; Mrs. J. A. Pegg and Mrs. Eugene Glidden, of this city.

**Funeral Tuesday Afternoon.**  
 Mr. Lutes' body is expected to reach this city Monday morning at 8 o'clock. The funeral will be held Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the residence, 815 West Boone street, now occupied by Mr. Lutes' daughter, Mrs. Robb. Rev. W. H. Scott will have charge of the service, and interment will be in Riverside. Mrs. Keese and Fred Lutes, of Ferguson, were at Norfolk at the time of their father's death, having reached there last Sunday. They, and perhaps other members of the family, will accompany the body north.

**GERMAN CHRISTMAS CONCERT.**

Audience of 300 Hears German Songs and Stories of Christmas.

A German setting, German music, German songs and German stories, most of them of the theme of Christmas, greeted the audience of about 300, many of whom were Germans, at the manual training building Thursday night. The program, which proved a delightful affair, was given by pupils of the German classes, boys and girls of German families from the graded schools, and others under the direction of Miss Igeria Getz. The concert was a great success and delighted the audience.

A Christmas tree stood upon the stage, and the scenery was set to represent a German home. About the tree were grouped the little children who took part.

The program was opened with a number on the mandolin, violin, and piano. "Die Wacht Am Rhein," played by Lee Keliang, Bart Downing, and Harold Hodges on the mandolin, Lorabel Richardson, violin, and Marjorie Miller, piano. A chorus of girls sang "O Du Frohliche." Miss Wellemeier sang a vocal solo, and eight little German children, four boys and four girls in a chorus sang "O Tannenbaum."

Recitations were given by Master John Banzhaf and Miss Rose Wenger, and Miss Marjorie Miller played a piano solo.

"Weihnachtstann" was the subject of the recitation given by Master Ralph Bowman, and a song of the same name was sung by a chorus of mail German boys. With the singing of the song, Donald Elder, dressed as Santa Claus, appeared and gave small gifts to the children who were on the stage. Helen Deakin recited "Alle Jahre Wieder," followed by a recitation by Master Frank Shinko. A chorus of the German children sang "Der Christbaum ist Der Schonste Baum," to the accompaniment played on the piano by Miss Pearl Baxter, who later played a solo.

The children in the audience under 16 years of age were asked to come forward and sacks of candy and nuts were given to them. The orchestra played for the closing number "Stille Nacht."

**IOWA VETERINARIANS TO MEET HERE SOON**

**TWENTY-THIRD ANNUAL CONVENTION OF GRADUATES ON JAN. 3, 4 AND 5.**

**DR. NEIMAN, OF THIS CITY, IS PRESIDENT**

Expected That Between Seventy-Five and 100 Members of Association Will Be in Attendance—Convention to Be Held at Marshalltown Club Rooms—Program Not Yet Arranged.

The twenty-third annual convention of the Iowa State Veterinary Medical Association will be held in this city early in January, the dates having been fixed for Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, Jan. 3, 4 and 5. The membership of the association comprises only graduate veterinarians of the state.

Dr. F. J. Neiman, of this city, is president of the association, and Dr. H. B. Treman, of Lake City, is vice president. The secretary and treasurer is Dr. Hal C. Stimson, of Denison.

It is expected that between seventy-five and 100 veterinarians of Iowa will be in attendance at the meeting. The program for the sessions has not yet been compiled in full, but it is expected that within a few days it will be made public.


