LOAN SHARK DISGORGES GIVEN ALTERNATIVE OF DIGGING UP OR BEING BEATEN THRU FLOOR. GIVES VICTIMS CHECKS FOR WAGES GARNISHED. William and James McCauley, of Cedar Rapids, Lock Money Lender in His Office and Force Him to Make Good For Quessing Them at Packing House.

Cedar Rapids, Dec. 20.—Being a "loan shark" has its drawbacks, even if it is an easy way of making money with but little invested if you have the nerve to collect 6 or 8 per cent per month, or whatever is charged by this particular brand of money lenders. Andrew Dugane had an experience here that caused his blood to practically stop its regular action for a few minutes. About two years ago William and James McCauley, who are employed at the packing house, borrowed some money from Dugane, signing one of his "contracts" and giving him the power of attorney to collect the principal and interest providing they did not keep up the regular payments. William borrowed \$12, and the amount secured by James, who has suddenly disappeared from town, is not known, although it is said to have been between \$10 and \$25.

About 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon they went to Dugane's office and found him alone in the room. They locked the door, removed their coats, doubled up their feet in true pugilistic style and informed Dugane that if he didn't pay them back the money he had secured at the packing house they intended to beat him thru the floor and into the store room below, or words to that effect. Dugane, so the police state, does not deny that he was frightened. Both men were considerably the worse for liquor, and they looked and acted as the they intended to carry out their threat. Dugane sat down at his desk and wrote out two checks, one in favor of William McCauley for \$134, and the other in favor of James McCauley for \$7. The two men then brought him down the stairs and to the corner at the Taft store, where Dugane was told if he let out a yell or called for help before they could get out of sight they would still carry out their threat.

William McCauley states that he has paid Dugane money at different times during the past two years, but did not know just how much he had paid. At one time Dugane claimed that William still owed him something like \$22. The two men say they have not been "coming across" regularly with their payments, and one day last week Dugane had their wages at the packing plant garnished. Threatened to "Beat Him Up." When the two brothers went to draw their pay Saturday they found that Dugane had tied up their money, a proceeding that angered them considerably. The two men were more or less thirsty, and going to the nearest saloon they imbibed freely and finally decided that they would get their money out of Dugane or "take it out of his hide."

Was Badly Frightened. Officer Smetana was standing near the three men, and noticed that Dugane was badly frightened. Finally the two brothers, going in opposite directions, and the officer stepped up to Dugane and asked him what had scared him. Dugane, after some hesitation, and making sure that the men were out of sight, told the policeman what had happened. Officer Smetana immediately started down First avenue and caught William McCauley as he was attempting to force his way thru the crowd. James McCauley hurried to a saloon and cashed his check, and evidently felt that the police had been unable to locate him. Dugane went to the office of Justice Sloan and had warrants issued against both men, charging them with threatening to extort.

BOYS DRINK POISON. Skaters Find Liquor Containing Knock-Out Drops. Sioux City, Dec. 20.—Meddlesome curiosities of youth resulted in a "near" tragedy when three boys, Russell Crumrine, Frank McDonald and Chester Lee, drank from a bottle containing an unknown liquor and immediately fell unconscious. The boys were skating on Bacon creek, just above the new conduit on the Correctionville road, and Crumrine and McDonald fell on the ice. Young Lee man for the shore and fell just as he reached the bank. Crumrine, staggering about on the ice, lunged into a hole and his legs were partly submerged in the icy water when he was found.

The boys were carried into the Smith house and a doctor summoned. Crumrine and McDonald were unconscious, while Lee was partially so. After the boys were temporarily cared for they were removed to their homes. The nature of the contents of the bottle which contained the "knock-out" drops is unknown. The boys claim that Crumrine found the fluid lying on the creek bank.

HARDIN COUNTY MAN INSANE. Herman Teske, Residing Near Owassa, and a Geary After Chicago Trip. Special to Times-Republican. Eldora, Dec. 20.—Herman Teske, a farmer living north of Eldora, near Owassa, was taken to Independence today after being before the insanity commission. For the past five days Teske has been furnishing all kinds of experiences to Eldorans. A short time ago Teske took a car load of hogs into Chicago and shortly after his return began to act queerly. He became so bad that he was finally taken to the Wheeler sanatorium for treatment. It appears to believe that someone is after him, and says they will kill him if they get him, and as a result he was continually running away. He escaped three times scantily clad. Several rumors are afloat as to the cause of Teske's sudden illness. One is that he was hit on the head or doped while in Chicago, another that he has been imbibing too freely on what he

brought back with him. Sheriff Walsh took Teske to Independence this morning. Information was filed by his brother, Reynolda Teske. The unfortunate man had been kept at the sanatorium because it was thought he might soon get over his queer notions. VETERAN FOUND DEAD. Ira Briley, Popular Boone Pioneer, Expires Without Warning. Boone, Dec. 20.—Death came with but a moment's warning Sunday afternoon to Ira Briley, popular pioneer resident and civil war veteran of this city. He was found lying out of doors, where he had fallen dead. He had been apparently in the best of health, was down town Saturday and on Sunday did his chores as usual, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. T. W. Guy. The Guy children had returned from church and Sunday school and he had been playing with them. He left them and walked out into the yard. A hemorrhage of the brain seized him and he fell over, dead.

The funeral was held this morning from the M. E. church, with the G. A. R. in charge and the body was taken to Ontario for interment. SUES SURGEONS FOR OPERATION. Council Bluffs Physicians Defendants in \$15,000 Suit. Council Bluffs, Dec. 20.—In the office of the clerk of the court Monday, Coral Hankins filed a petition in a suit for \$15,000 damages against Henry A. Reichenbach and Macrae, the plaintiff claims that on or about Feb. 25, 1910, Dr. Reichenbach was called to attend her for an illness which he diagnosed as appendicitis. By his instructions she was taken to the Edmondson hospital and Dr. Macrae was called by Reichenbach to operate for the supposed appendicitis, which he did in the afternoon of the day mentioned. The plaintiff alleges that she did not have appendicitis and that the surgeons did not find her appendix affected. She asks damages for bodily and mental suffering as well as an order compelling the defendants to pay her the cost of the operation.

ABANDONED WELL CONFISCATED. Corning Authorities Accidentally Solve Water Shortage. Special to Times-Republican.
