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MARSHALLTOWN'S POPULATION 13,374 GAIN OF 1,830, OR MORE THAN 15 PER CENT, SINCE 1900 CENSUS. MOST OF GAIN HAS BEEN IN THE LAST FIVE YEARS Of the Gain For the Ten Years More Than 1,300 of It Has Been in the Last Half of That Time—Comparative Figures of Various Censuses of City and State.

The city's official population is 13,374. This is the population according to the thirteenth federal census as sent out today from Washington to the Times-Republican. The increase over the population according to the census taken in 1900, is 1,830, and over the 1890 census is 4,460. The increase in the last five years is 1,329. In 1905 the state census was taken. Most of the gain during the last ten years has come during the last five years, from 1905 to the present time. During the last five years the gain, as given above, has been 1,329, compared with but 501, the gain from 1900 to 1905. It was during this period, from 1900 to 1905, that the city received backsets that affected its population. Some of these were the closing of the glucose factory, the removal of the Iowa Central general offices, and the failure of the Rhoades-Carmen Buggy Company. All these took people out of the city. In the last five years the growth has been steady and sure, if not unusually large.

Percentage Increase, Almost 16. The percentage of increase in the population, compared with 1900, is very close to 16, and to be exact it is 15.85. This shows a good healthy percentage of growth, and it is especially satisfactory when it is considered that more than thirteen-eighths of this gain has been made in five years. For all practical purposes of business and population this city's count should include the membership of the Iowa Soldiers Home and the employes who live there, numbering fully 1,000. But this census does not allow, and while them members and employes trade in the city and add to its commercial worth they are not included in the population.

Count Probably Accurate. There is every reason to believe that the federal census is accurate. The population it gives the city and the census taken by the Marshalltown Club at about the same time are not far apart. The Pettibone Directory Company estimated the population in the spring, at the time its last directory was issued, at 13,302. Had the same rate of growth been maintained during the entire ten years, since the 1900 census, as was maintained during the last five years, the city would have had a population of 14,400 and made an unusual showing. That it did not was due principally to the drawbacks from 1900 to 1905 that have been mentioned above.

Compared with Other Cities. Mason City, that has been making such tremendous boasts as to size, has but a population of 11,420, according to the federal figures given out today, and Oskaloosa's population is but 9,465 compared with 9,212 ten years ago. Mason City has gained 4,484 in ten years, but it still has some distance to go to catch up with this city. While the increase in percentage in the city's population is not so large as some cities of the state, such as Des Moines, Sioux City, and Waterloo, it is still larger than others. Clinton's percentage increase was 12.7. Dubuque was 6.1, Council Bluffs 13.5, Oskaloosa less than 3, while Keokuk actually lost 638 in population during the ten years.
