POSTAL "DISCOVERS" IKERMAN.

Buffalo Butcher Boy Sees Evident Future For Eldora Champion. Special to Times-Republican. Eldora, Dec. 30.—Charley Postil, the Buffalo butcher boy, who has made quite a reputation as a wrestler, ac-

ording to the Chicago Tribune of Thursday, has discovered another "white man's hope" in Ed Bergmann, of Eldora, who at one time was champion of the United States navy. While in the marine service Ikerman had fifteen fights and won all of them, save one by the knockout route. According to Postil, Ikerman was given a real test Wednesday in a private bout with Jack Lewis, the coast fighter, and Postil's protégé won in six rounds by a knockout. Postil Wednesday issued a formal challenge to Carl Morris, who is being spoken of as the Oklahoma "hope" and if Ikerman is successful in this bout he intends to match his man with all the good heavyweights in the hope of finally getting a match with Johnson. Ikerman weighs about 185 pounds and is over six feet tall. According to Postil he is clever and a hard hitter. Ikerman left Eldora a short time before Thanksgiving, going to Chicago, where he has been in training ever since.

GERMAN SOLDIER BURIED.

Pathetic Incident Connected With Side of Ernest Bergmann. Special to Times-Republican. Iowa City, Dec. 30.—Ernest Bergmann, the soldier of the German army, who committed suicide here on Christmas, was buried yesterday. The sale of his effects, few the way they were, together with a small sum of money that was due him for labor, and a little cash donated by charitable Amish farmers for whom Bergmann had worked in by-gone years, made Christian burial possible.

A pathetic incident developed when Acting Coroner Crosscut came into possession of a letter received from Germany since the death of Bergmann. It was written by the dead man's sister, thanking him for the money he sent as a Christmas present, for which, she wrote, she was especially grateful, as he was in dire need. The money was doubtless the last the veteran had, with the exception of a few nickels, which he spent the night before his suicide. Thus he observed Christmas by making happier his absent sister, altho he also took his own life on that day. The sister, of course, knows nothing of the tragedy yet.
