LODGE CASE IS BEGUN. Action Against Jones & Johnson on Note Stated. The suit begun by the trustees of Woodland Lodge, No. 541, Knights of Pythias, of Rhodes, against Jones & Johnson to collect on a promissory note for \$250, was begun this morning in the district court. W. T. Jones is the only defendant in court, Johnson having left the state. It is alleged that the firm of Jones & Johnson never paid more than \$50 to the trustees of the lodge; that later, when the note was presented for payment,

Jones refused to pay it. It is the contention of the plaintiff lodge that Jones & Johnson was a co-partnership, and on that theory Jones is held to be responsible for the act of the firm of which he is alleged to have been a member.

The defense in the case is that the relations of Jones to Johnson were those of landlord and tenant, and that no co-partnership existed, and that if the note was signed by the name of Jones and Johnson it was so signed without the authority or knowledge of Jones, who knew nothing of the existence of the note until payment was demanded.
