MAY NOT FILE AT ALL

Rumor That Saloon Petition Will Not Be Filed at All Unless 1,700 Signers Are Secured—Rumor Lacks Verification.

A rumor that had its source in a conversation which took place among a group of saloon sympathizers this morning was to the effect the saloon petition would not be filed at all unless 1,700 signers were secured. The reason, the conversation developed, was that if this number was not secured the petition would not be filed so that a second attempt to circulate a petition could be made in a few months.

The law specifies that the board of supervisors shall not canvass more than one saloon consent petition a year. A petition that contained 1,700 signatures would have 113 more than a majority.

GLASS FALLS FOUR STORIES.

Chips Cement Sidewalk But Fortunately Misses Passersby. The falling of a heavy plate glass from a fourth story window of the Letts-Fletcher Company office building at Main and Second avenue shortly before noon today might have proved disastrous to passersby had the glass fallen on its downward plunge a few minutes later, when the street would have been filled with noon-hour traffic.

The glass, probably forced outward by lumber piled near it from the inside, fell heavily enough to chip the cement walk. One man happened to be passing at the time, but was near the curb line and was not injured. Out For Time; Thrown From Buggy. While out for a time, and under the influence of liquor, James Lynch, an Iowa Central switchman, was pretty badly bruised about noon today when he fell from a buggy near the Riverside cemetery gates on Center street. Lynch was driving a McCombs livery rig and was running the horse. A physician was called to attend to Lynch's injuries, and the young man was turned over to relatives. After Lynch fell off the horse ran back on Center street to State, turned west to First, and thence south. At the Church street corner, in turning toward the barn, the buggy collided with a telephone pole and was pretty badly demolished.

SIGNERS SCARCE

Saloonists in Distress For Signatures and it is Reported That Questionable Methods Are Being Used. The Marshall County Citizens' Association is in possession of information from a citizen to the effect that he has been offered \$2 to sign a saloon petition and to the effect that an inmate of the county jail has also been offered money to sign a saloon petition. The statute is very positive in making it bribery both to give and take money as consideration for signing a saloon consent and there is trouble promised for those upon whom the offense can be proved.

Signers are exceedingly scarce. The anti have been out this week checking up on their figures. They have the pledges of 1,352 who signed the remonstrance against saloons and who have promised not to sign for saloons. They also have the promises of \$19 more who will sign a remonstrance against saloons but who did not sign the former remonstrance. There are a total 104 more than a majority of those who voted at the city election. However there is yet a list of nearly 600 who have said that they would not sign either way and in order to ascertain how well these men were withstanding the onslaught of the saloon canvassers committees have been out this week interviewing them.

A total of 424 of these neutrals have been given to committees at work in twenty-five districts. At noon today seven districts have reported 116 neutrals, seven of whom 99 are determined not to sign and only 17 are reported who have either signed or who can't be found. If this average on one-fourth the list keeps up there will be at least 400 neutrals in addition to 1,672 remonstrance fellows who will refuse to sign. Only in very rare instances can anyone be found of the remonstrance fellows who has signed for saloons. So the saloon petitions can't contain much over 1,000 to 1,100 bona fide names.

The petition must be filed Saturday or else those who signed on the first day must sign again to come within the thirty day limit. If it is filed every name will be copied and committees sent to the residences of the signers to ascertain whether the signature is bona fide. If forgeries are discovered the man who made affidavit to the signature will probably have to stand trial. Over 200 men have agreed to
