NORTHUP CITY ATTORNEY

F. E. Northup Elected City Solicitor by New Council—Salary \$1,000 a Year—Gives Up Fee in City's Gas Case.

F. E. Northup, who has been city solicitor under the old city administration, was elected city solicitor by the new city council at an adjourned meeting held this afternoon. The resolution for his election for a term of two years was introduced by Lamb and the motion to adopt was seconded by Herman. The appointment becomes effective April 3, but he does not begin to draw salary until he files his bond and qualifies. Mr. Northup, in a communication addressed to the council, agreed to accept the salary of \$1,000 and if appointed to make no charge for services in the case of the city vs. the Marshalltown Light, Power and Railway Company, now in the federal court if the case is tried during his term of office. The city is to pay all traveling expenses incurred by Northup when away on city business.

MRS. BECKMAN DEAD.

Former Marshalltown Girl Succumbs to Severe Illness at Westchester.

Marshalltown friends of Mrs. Emma Wilson Beckman, of Grundy Center, a former Marshalltown girl and daughter of Mrs. Mary C. Smalley, 105 West Webster street, will be pained to learn of Mrs. Beckman's death in the early hours of Thursday, May 4, following an extensive surgical operation performed a week ago last Monday.

Mrs. Beckman's case has been most

severe from the start. The operation was for a severe abdominal trouble, affecting the intestines, and during the operation the surgeons were compelled to await the close of the work for fear that the patient would die on the table. There has hardly been any hope for the patient at any time, altho slight rallies were noticeable on different days. A telegram announcing their sister's death was received by Messrs. J. J. Wilson and Tney Smalley Thursday night.

Mrs. Smalley, Mrs. Beckman's mother, is at Grundy Center, and the news of her daughter's death has so prostrated the mother that fears are entertained for her life. Mrs. Smalley is a victim of heart disease, and the shock of the death proved too great. Both sons hastened to Grundy Center Thursday night to be with their mother.

Emma Wilson was born in Albion, in April, 1865. Her father, the late Thomas J. Wilson, was the first lawyer to take up practice in the town of Lafayette, now known as Albion, and was the first editor of the county, having founded the Central Journal, at Lafayette, in 1855. Mr. Wilson was later county superintendent of schools, and was drowned in 1868 while on his way home from Edenville, where he had been to visit a school. Mr. Wilson was making the trip on horseback, and it was necessary for him to ford Timber Creek, which was then badly swollen by heavy rains.

Mrs. Wilson became Mrs. Beckman in this city about twenty-five years ago. Mr. Beckman is one of the prominent business men of Grundy Center, and is president of both the Grundy County National and the Grundy County Savings Banks. Mrs. Beckman has but one child—a son, Karl, 23 years old.

Mrs. Beckman was well known throughout Iowa in Eastern Star circles, and at the Boone convention, last October, was elected grand worthy matron. For several years previous to her election she was a district inspector of the order.

Aside from her husband and son Mrs. Beckman is survived by her mother, two brothers, and one sister. The brothers are Thomas Wilson, of Minneapolis, and James J. Wilson, of this city. The sister is Mrs. Mina Lillibridge, of Grundy Center. Three half brothers also survive, in the persons of William Smalley, of Winterset; Tney W. Smalley, a pipeman at central fire station, and Frank Smalley, of Cleveland, O.

Mrs. Beckman's body is expected to reach Grundy Center tonight, and it is expected that the funeral will be held Sunday afternoon. Several friends from the city expect to be present at the funeral.
