TRUSTEES CALLED ON TO ENFORCE LAW

COUNTY ATTORNEY CITES TOWNSHIP BOARDS TO PUT DRAGGING LAW IN OPERATION

CALLS ATTENTION TO NEW LAW THAT NOW GOVERNS

Is Now Compulsory For Township Trustees to Arrange For Road Dragging at April Meeting or at Special Meeting—Most Important Provisions of New Law.

In a circular letter mailed today to the township trustees of the county, County Attorney A. C. Daly, calls the attention of the trustees to the new state road dragging law and "puts it up" to them to see that the law is enforced in their respective townships.

The law went in force with its publication on April 8, and provides for penalties in the shape of fines if it is violated.

While the county attorney makes no intimation or threat of prosecution for failure to enforce the law, he calls the trustees' attention to it and asks that immediate action be taken looking toward carrying out the provisions of the law. Copies of the law were mailed to the township trustees by County Auditor A. H. Welker a short time ago.

Important Parts of the Law. The important features of this new law are as follows: It makes it the duty of the township trustees, at their regular April meeting of this year, or at a special meeting called for the purpose, to divide the public roads of the township into permanent road-dragging districts, which are to be numbered.

The trustees are to designate from time to time what road districts are to be dragged, which must include all the main routes and the main traveled roads. The trustees are to appoint a superintendent of dragging, who is to hold office for one year, unless sooner removed. This superintendent is to be paid \$250 per day, and other compensation as the trustees may direct. The township trustees are to furnish the road drags.

Pay For Dragging. Suitable notice is to be given by the superintendent when ordering the roads dragged, and a book of records of the dragging is to be kept by him. The trustees, at their November and April meetings, are to settle with the superintendent and pay all claims for dragging at the rate of 50 cents a mile, dragged both ways. No allowance for dragging is to be made unless it was done at the order of the superintendent. The trustees shall levy 1 mill on the township assessment each year, which is to be used only for road dragging.

The superintendent of dragging is to make contracts on or before April 15 of each year with as many persons as are needed to drag the country roads, but he shall not apportion more than six miles for any one person to drag. The penalty for any violation of the law is a fine of not less than \$10 or more than \$25 for the first offense and for each subsequent offense not less than \$25 nor more than \$50.

Dr. Roth's Funeral. The funeral of Dr. A. D. Roth, who died Saturday, was largely attended Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock from the Methodist church at State Center, Rev. F. N. Dwell, pastor of the church, officiating. On behalf of the physicians of State Center Dr. Theodore Engle

applied briefly of Dr. Roth as a practitioner. A mixed quartet furnished the music. From this city were present at the funeral Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Sparks, E. B. Coleman, and Mr. and Mrs. Schaefer. Accompanying the latter was Miss Harter, of Tiffin, O., a friend of Dr. Roth from his former home. Interment was in Elmwood cemetery.

CASE IS AFFIRMED.

Supreme Court Upholds Judge Bradshaw's Action on Demurrer.

A supreme court decision, handed down today in the case of John H. Boyd, of Crookston, Minn., vs. Stipp & Harlan, a former St. Anthony grain firm, affirms the decision of Judge Bradshaw, in the lower court, in sustaining the defendant's demurrer to the plaintiff's petition, in which it was set out that the plaintiff had no case.

A man named Grove, a tenant of Boyd, sold grain and other material to Stipp & Harlan and others, and Boyd brought suit against those to whom the articles were sold, claiming a landlord's lien, and seeking to recover. There were four different cases and all were grouped under the title of Boyd, vs. Stipp & Harlan, et al. Judge Bradshaw sustained the demurrer of the defendants to the plaintiff's petition, and the appeal was taken on the court's action, which the supreme court now affirms.

GRAHAM SENT TO CLARINDA.

Former Member of the Soldiers' Home Sent to State Hospital.

William Graham, a Polk county veteran who was a member of the soldiers' home until recently, and who was twice arraigned before the commissioners of insanity here during the last six months, has been sent to the state hospital for the insane at Clarinda. Graham was recently discharged from the home because the officials thought it impossible to control him. He returned home to Des Moines and very soon afterwards was arrested on a charge of insanity, declared insane, and

ordered confined in the state hospital. His arrests here on charges of insanity were at the instance of home officials, but after both hearings the commissioners decided Graham was not insane.

Odeon Opens For Summer Run of Vaudeville.

The Odeon opened Monday night for its run of vaudeville, which is to continue with nightly performances and two matinees a week until the theatrical season begins in the fall. Two rolls of films, an illustrated song, and two vaudeville acts make up the performance. The vaudeville last night comprised Cantro and Curtis, singers and dancers, and Fox and Durkin in a comedy sketch called "An Auto Disaster." A large audience witnessed the first performance. The second audience was smaller.
